DECREASE OF CHILDREN

According to a report just made by State Superintendent Fuqua of the Department of Public Instruction there are 730,349 children of school age in Kentucky. The report shows a decrease of 5,421 as compared with last year. The school fund is given as \$2,420,879.80, Louisville's share being \$205,994.75, and that of Jefferson county \$28,525.25. One-sixth of this amount will be paid in October.
