THE EARTH TREMBLED. Huge Block of Concrete Has Clear Drop of 16 Feet.

Something "dropped" up at the Y, M. C. A. building Thursday. Workmen had raised a huge block of concrete just eight enough to be pulled into position over the arch spanning the front entrance, when the hook in the block through which the rope runs broke and the piece of concrete fell to the pavement, a distance of 16 or more feet. The block is about 8 feet long, 20 inches in width and 8 inches thick. It weighs about two tons. It made the earth tremble, but the fall in no way injured the block. Would a piece of stone the same size stand the fall without being broken? It certainly was a good test of the concrete.

Poultry Men Organize.




