The Weather. For Kentucky: Probably snow flurries and colder Thursday.

R. M. Smith, of Louisville, was elected State President of the order of Gideons, in session at Paducah.

Dick Miller ceased to be so "absolutely sure" after the first test vote was taken.

Wm. R. Hearst is preparing to start a newspaper in Cincinnati, which will aim to swing Ohio into line for Hearst for President in 1908.

The state of Indiana has begun the manufacture of "binder twine" in one of the penitentiaries in opposition to the twine trust.

Jas. O. Davidson has succeeded Senator LaFollette as Governor of Wisconsin. Davidson came from Norway 30 years ago, a penniless and friendless youth.

The Blackburn faction in Hopkins county held a mass convention at Madisonville Monday and adopted resolutions calling on Mun Wilson and Frank Rives to vote for Senator Blackburn.

A bill to regulate the investment of money collected in this State by the insurance companies is to be introduced in the Legislature at Frankfort.

A survey is being made for a new county to be formed of parts of Ohio, Breckenridge and Grayson. A bill looking to its formation will be introduced by Representative C. C. Beard.

As the result of a conference between the election contestants and contestees in Breathitt county all contests excepting that involving the office of County Clerk have been withdrawn.

The Courier-Journal's attempt to hoodwink the undecided ones into jumping into the wrong bandwagon was praiseworthy politics but mighty unreliable journalism. The persistent assertions of the three Miller papers that it was all over but the shouting fooled everybody but the Lawrence men.

The plan of the Chicago Record-Herald to send Walter Wellman from Spitzbergen in an airship to search for the North Pole is being taken seriously in many quarters. Andree, who started to the pole in a balloon in July 1897, was able to keep afloat and sent a pigeon back two days later and a noted Swedish explorer says an airship could have reached the Pole in two days more.

Senator Blackburn took the field against the administration three years too late. LAWRENCE AN EASY WINNER.

Nominated Before the Roll Call Was Completed.

GEORGE IN THE SENATE.

Administration Forces Confident of Sweeping Victory All Along the Line.

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 2.—The State administration made a clean sweep last night in organizing both Democratic caucuses by decisive majorities and giving Henry Lawrence such a majority for Speaker of the House of Representatives that before the vote had been completed R. W. Miller, the anti-administration candidate, moved to make the nomination of Lawrence unanimous.

Henry George, of Graves county, the Paynter candidate for Chairman of the Senate caucus, defeated Laban Phelps by 18 to 13 votes.

HON. HENRY LAWRENCE.

Henry R. Lawrence, of Cadiz, who was elected Speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives, was born in Trigg county five miles Southwest of Cadiz in September, 1873. He moved to Cadiz with his parents in 1884. In 1886 he secured a position as "devil" in the office of the old Kentucky Telephone, working the first two months for nothing, after which he received \$1.25 per week for the next six months. In January, 1890, he was taken to Frankfort by Hon. Wm. Wharton, then Representative in the Lower House of the General Assembly of Kentucky from Trigg county, who succeeded in electing him one of the pages in the House for that session. After the adjournment of the Legislature he returned home and resumed his old position in the Kentucky Telephone office. In January, 1898, he bought Judge G. B. Bingham's half interest in the Kentucky Telephone, and since that time has been one of the proprietors of that paper—now the Cadiz Record—becoming the editor of same in January, 1900. In 1901 he received the Democratic nomination for Representative in Trigg county by about 400 majority over Judge R. P. Turney, of Cerulean Springs, and in the final election defeated Dr. John C. Taylor, one of the strongest Republicans in Trigg county, by a handsome majority. Again, in 1903, he was given the nomination and final election for the same place without opposition. Last spring he was opposed by three of the strongest Democrats in Trigg county for the nomination for a third term, and only lacked four votes of getting as many as all of his opponents; and in the recent November election was elected without opposition, notwithstanding the Republican leaders of the State urged their leaders in that county to nominate someone against him.

Mr. Lawrence's father died in August, 1888, leaving him, with the assistance of his younger brother, John S. Lawrence, as the sole support of a widowed mother, baby brother and two sisters.

Ed Mackey Found Hiding In One Of Them.

Mrs. S. H. Harrison's house was entered by a thief Monday night and a hand bag stolen from a bureau drawer. It contained a purse with some valuable papers, but no money. The purse was thrown down out side the house and was returned to Mrs. Harrison by an officer to whom it was delivered. The same night a thief entered Maj. E. B. Bassett's house and took Mrs. Bassett's purse containing \$5 in change and some meat tickets. Later in the night a negro named Ed Mackey was caught in Mr. T. J. Tate's residence by his son, Leslie Tate, and taken to jail. About \$4 and some meat tickets were found in his pockets.

Mackey was turned over to County Judge Breathitt, who committed him to jail.

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
