## FIVE YEARS FOR MANSLAUGHTER,

The Verdict in the Case of Ed Greenwade, Charged With Murder.

**COURTNEY JURY HUNG.**

Another Murder Case Given to the Jury Yesterday Afternoon.

The trial of Ed Greenwade, col., charged with murder, was called in court Wednesday afternoon, and both sides being ready, the jury was soon made up from the regular panel and the taking of testimony was begun. The last witness was examined Thursday morning and the case was given to the jury after the argument early in the afternoon. After deliberating about an hour a verdict was returned finding the defendant guilty of manslaughter. His punishment was fixed at five years in the penitentiary. Greenwade was charged with the killing of Oscar White, another negro, at a festival near Pee Dee one night last year.

Yesterday morning the trial of Alfred Lisaby, who is charged with the killing of George Campbell, alias Bacon, another negro, in the southern suburbs of the city last year, was begun. Lisaby was indicted for murder. The following is a list of jurors: C. W. Jones, N. O. King, and Watt Dollins of the regular panel, and R. A. Haddock, G. W. Word, W. S. Clark, B. F. Fuller, J. C. White, Jas. Ricketts, R. O. Torian, and W. E. Hankin. The case was given to the jury yesterday afternoon.

The case of John Cheaney, under an indictment charging murder, has been set for the twelfth day of the term. The court has appointed J. T. Hanbery, John Stites and Judge C. H. Bush to defend Cheaney.

No verdict had been returned in the Courtney case up to yesterday afternoon. This case was given to the jury at noon last Tuesday. The general opinion is that the jury is hung tight and fast and that no agreement will be reached.

## NIXON RESIGNS.

**Vacancy Filled By Temporary Appointment.**

Policeman W. H. Nixon tendered his resignation Monday and the resignation was accepted by Mayor Meacham Thursday morning and the place temporarily filled by the appointment of W. T. Broderick, who will serve until the council elects an officer on March 16th. Mr. Broderick formerly resided in Elkton and has had a good deal of experience as a policeman.

## SHOT IN THE CHIN.

**Marshal Jackson Brings Law Breaker to Jail.**

Cleveland Jones and Walter Graham, Pembroke negroes, became involved in a difficulty Saturday night and the latter was shot in the chin. The wound is not considered a very dangerous one. Jones surrendered to Marshal Jackson. The prisoner was brought here and placed in jail to await the action of the grand jury.

**Grand Jury Will Investigate.**

Four Gracey negroes were brought here by Marshal Cox and lodged in jail, charged with breaking the seal of an I. C. box car.

## Death of Prisoner.

Judge Wilson, col., who was placed in jail here recently on a charge of unlawfully detaining a woman, died in the hospital ward of the building Wednesday afternoon, after an illness of about ten days, of pneumonia.

To Kill The Gaines Bill In The Senate

**SAME AS LAST YEAR.**

Prospects of Relief For Tobacco Growers Is Not Bright.

Washington, March 9.—The prospect of relief for the tobacco growers of Kentucky at this session of Congress is, to say the least, remote. The passage by the House of the bill to take off the tax of 6 cents a pound on leaf tobacco created momentary elation, but the Kentucky Congressmen who have been faithfully pushing that measure were not long in making the discovery that they are up against the "real thing" over in the Senate.

It was in the Senate that a similar bill met its Waterloo at the last session.

## SNUFF CO.'S NEW FACTORY

Will Soon Be Under Construction on Base Ball Park.

**ARRANGEMENTS MADE.**

Will Be a Two-Story Brick Building To Cost \$50,000.

The American Snuff Co., which decided not to build its factory in this city last summer, announces that it will begin work about the first of April.

The factory, or rather the re-handling house, will be situated on the old Base Ball grounds and will front on Walnut street. It will be set back from Walnut street about 40 or 50 feet. The building will be of brick, two stories high and will be L shaped and have a floor space of 40,000 feet.

It will cost \$40,000 or \$50,000 to erect it.

The house will be a receiving depot for tobacco purchased from the farmers for the Company's factories in other cities and will work 75 to 100 hands and will handle 5,000,000 lbs. of loose tobacco.

Mr. W. McL. Cowan and Mr. W. M. Hancock are the Company's local representatives.

This enterprise is one of the many permanent and desirable improvements now under way in Hopkinsville. It will be of lasting benefit to the city, affording a good local market for a large amount of the tobacco brought to Hopkinsville from Christian and adjoining counties.

## KILLED FOUR.
