WHIRLWIND CAMPAIGN

Is Inaugurated to Raise
Eight Thousand Dollars
In Ten Days.

FOR Y. M. C. A. BUILDING.

Committee Formulated at a
Banquet Given Mon-
day Night.

Forty leading business men attended a banquet at the Odd Fellows building Monday night by the local directors of the Y. M. C. A. for the purpose of inaugurating a whirlwind campaign to raise \$8,000 in ten days to complete the building, upon which work was stopped a year ago for lack of funds. The party assembled at eight o'clock and as soon as the banquet was over Mr. F. J. Brownell, chairman of the Board of Directors, introduced Henry E. Rosevear, of Louisville, the State Secretary, as toastmaster, and the following speeches were made: "Hopkinsville's Greatest Asset, Its Young Men," Mayor C. M. Meacham; "A Four-Square Man," the Rev. Harry D. Smith; "Our Opportunity," Judge W. T. Fowler; "How We Did It," William H. Weaver, Henderson, Ky.; "The Campaign," Will A. House, of Louisville; "The Ladies," T. C. Underwood.

The delightful menu was supplied by the Ladies' committee of the Young Men's Christian Association. All of the men present were made members of the Citizens' committee which will canvass the city for the additional funds to complete the building. James West, president of the Commercial and Savings Bank, was made chairman of the Executive Committee. The slogan of the committee will be, "\$8,000 in Ten Days," and the headquarters will be in the Planters' Bank.

Mr. Rosevear made an especially happy toastmaster and all of the speeches were interspersed with pleasantries and proved to be very entertaining.

Mr. Underwood's speech was in his best vein and its humor and flights of sentiment made a decided hit and the champion of the fair sex went home loaded down with floral decorations. Mr. Weaver, a young insurance agent, also insured everybody against having a dull time while he was up.

A campaign executive committee was formed with Judge W. P. Winfree, chairman; J. H. Anderson, L. L. Elgin, Jas. West and F. J. Brownell. The announcement was made that \$2,000 of the \$8,000 had been guaranteed by the directors and the big deal placed in the window at the Planters' Bank was started with the hand pointing to that figure. It will be moved from time to time, as fast as \$100 is subscribed, until all has been raised by December 20th.

Mr. House will remain to assist in the work.

The collections yesterday afternoon amounted to \$2,300.
