COMMERCIAL CLUB BANQUET

Will Celebrate the First Anniversary of Its Organization.

BUSY SESSION HELD

President of L. & N. Railroad Invited to Visit the City.

The Commercial Club held a busy session Thursday night, with the president, Dr. J. B. Jackson, in the chair. It was the first meeting held for some time, but the attendance was good and some important business was transacted.

Secretary L. H. Davis reported that progress was being made in the direction of a street railway and something definite could be announced soon.

The club voted to encourage the Music Festival in May and a committee was named to help solicit funds. The Fiscal Court was strongly urged to take steps at once to pike the Madisonville road to the coal banks. County Attorney Duffy stated that the court was disposed to build about six miles' more of pike this year on that road, which would go within three miles of Crofton.

The coal question was then taken up and a committee was appointed to investigate and determine whether the mines, the railroads or the dealers were responsible for the increase of two to three cents in the retail price of coal. Messrs. John Feland, J. W. Knight and Hancock Higgins were put on the committee.

A committee was appointed to confer with President W. C. White, of the Cadiz railroad, and try to get better connection at Gracey with the Hopkinsville train. Messrs. Geo. E. Gary, J. T. Wall and E. B. Bassett were put on this committee.

On motion of M. C. Forbes, President M. H. Smith, of the L. & N. Railroad, was invited to visit Hopkinsville as the guest of the Commercial Club, to see in person the rapid growth of the city and its needs of increased facilities. Geo. E. Gary was appointed to go to Louisville and extend the invitation in person, at once.

The coming visit of the Jamestown promoters Jan. 25th was discussed and a welcome voted.
