Several New Asylum Appointments Are Announced.

PROMOTIONS MADE.

New Officials Will Assume Their Duties On May 15th.

The expected Asylum appointments have been made and a general system of promotions followed.

Dr. J. W. Stevens returns from Lakeland as superintendent of the Western asylum. Dr. Alex Bailey becomes superintendent at the Feeble Minded Institute and Dr. Mulligan at the Lakeland asylum.

Dr. Gardner becomes first assistant at Lakeland, Dr. Nevitt first at Lexington and Dr. Jo M. Ferguson first in the Western Asylum. All of these are promotions that leave vacancies as second assistants to be filled. The changes all take place on May 15th.

Dr. Stephens' return to the asylum here will give general satisfaction. As second assistant here several years he made many friends and developed a rare fitness for asylum work and he will no doubt make a most capable and efficient superintendent.

DETECTIVES HERE

And Are Ready to Help Catch the Night Riders.

T. J. Cundiff and T. B. Pedigo the former a deputy marshal, arrived here Thursday to make an investigation of the "night riders" in this section. They will proceed like any other officers, but will have men under them. Their supposed object in acting openly is to give law-abiding people an opportunity to impart information and to let county officials co-operate with them if they desire to. All people who are opposed to barn burning and similar crimes are expected to give whatever aid they dare to in the state of terror that exists in some localities.

BARN BURNED.

In Burley District by Night Riders.

The tobacco barn of W. A. Shirley, who has been buying for the trust in Carroll county, was burned by incendiaries at Sanders, early Thursday night. The barn contained 200,000 pounds of fine Burley tobacco. This is the first time that a barn has been burned since the tobacco war began in the Burley district. Bloodhounds will be used in an effort to trace the incendiaries. The loss is \$30,000.

HEAR "PARSIFAL" READY FOR

Great Wagnerian Composition Given and Explained.

City's Greatest Musical Event Drawing Near.

Frederick Neil Innes, the famous bandmaster, who is a well known authority on the Wagnerian music, will give a brief explanation of not only the music but also the wonderful poem which Germany's immortal composer, Richard Wagner, has so remarkably set to music in the festival opera of "Parsifal," during the production to be given in this city during the May Music Festival. "Parsifal" is, in a sense, a passion play as truly as is the drama which is given periodically at the world famous Ober-Ammergau festival. Many critics have assailed Wagner's taste in portraying such incidents as the washing of Parsifal's feet by Kundry, which they claim is a thinly veiled reproduction of the washing by Mary Magdalene of the feet of Jesus, and the spear wound in the side which Amfortas is portrayed as incurably suffering from. But all these charges have been exploded by a fuller knowledge of the great work which is now generally accepted as being a remarkably inspired poem in which is shown the temptations, sorrows and sufferings of the world and its redemption by purity, faith and love.

Mr. Innes, in his brief analytical discussion will show all these things. He will illustrate his remarks by the playing of some of the principal motives of the work explaining each in such a way that the listener in the subsequent hearing of the music itself may follow the play of these different themes throughout the entire work. The story of each theme will be shown and the intent of each made so plain that even the unmusical listener will be enabled to follow and enjoy the music which might otherwise be devoid of meaning and interest.

While it is true, of course, that this whole performance—the popular music which precedes the more serious work, Mr. Innes' illustrated discussion itself and the Parsifal performance—has been carefully chosen with a view to please the average nonmusical listener, yet it is apparent that such a unique opportunity for hearing one of the country's most famous Wagnerian authorities on this pre-eminent subject must appeal with still greater force even to the musician or student.
