VALUABLE FUND OF FLUOR SPARE

And Other Minerals by the Gracey Mining Company.

ON CHAS. COX FARM.

Mining Experts Believe a Real Source of Wealth Has Been Uncovered

The Gracey Mining Company has made a sensational discovery of valuable minerals on the farm of Chas. M. Cox, three miles north of Gracey. Samples of the vein show valuable and it is believed paying deposits of fluor spar, zinc and lead. Last year Engineer Fritz, of Marion, did considerable work on the leased lands of the company and returned a few weeks ago. The vein discovered is within four or five feet of the surface. The mine is located within 400 yards of the I. C. railroad.

The company is highly elated over the prospects. Thos. Shaw, of Cadiz, is President, and J. T. Wall, of this city, is Secretary of the company. Samples of them are being assayed and if it is as valuable as it seems preparations will at once be made to begin mining.

The company has leased the mineral lands for a term of years.

Four Markets of Association Make Big Score for Last Week.

Prices Ranged All the Way from \$6 to \$14 per Hundred Lbs.

The gladdest piece of news that has gone out to the tobacco raiser is that of John D. Scales, Auditor of the Tobacco Growers Association, in which he reports the sale by the association of 6,071 hhds. of tobacco during the week ending last Saturday, May 18th. The lowest price obtained was \$6 per 100 lbs. and there were but 3 hhds. sold at that price. Four hhds. were sold at \$13 and over, and one at \$14. The crowded condition of our columns forbids our giving the sales in full, but we have grouped them as well as we could, which will give our readers a good idea of the high prices obtained. These figures are official and will greatly encourage the tobacco raisers of the entire tobacco producing section of the country.

Montgomery, La., May 15.—"I object, she is my old sweetheart and promised to marry me," said Daniel Contee, a young merchant of this place, Thursday night in the Methodist church, when the pastor, in performing the nuptials for Miss Mary Tomisee, belle of the town, and William Tullos, a planter, and her affianced husband, reached that part of the ceremony where the question is asked: "If anyone present has any objections, let him speak now or forever hold his peace."
