## DR. G. H. MEANS ON NIGHT RIDING

Methodist Pastor Denounces Lawlessness With Great Vigor.

### PRaises L. & O. LEAGUE

Declares Public Sentiment Is Aroused And People Will Fight For Peace.

Probably no city in Kentucky is blessed with a more faithful, devoted and courageous ministry than Hopkinsville. Almost without exception the pastors of the city have preached sermons after sermon to mould public opinion against the prevailing lawlessness and bring about a respect for law and order. Most of them have preached special sermons, fearlessly denouncing all forms of lawlessness and pleading for return to peace and quietude. A sermon of this kind was preached Sunday night by Rev. Geo. H. Means, pastor of the Methodist church, whose subject was "The Lawful and the Lawless." It was heard by a large congregation in spite of the inclement weather. The body of the discourse was devoted to the "lawful", being a strong plea for right, justice between man and man and for the application of the golden rule. Toward the close he took up the depredations of night riders and told of the destruction of seven warehouses, of the whipping of 36 men and the shooting up of a number of cities and towns. "They have done all this" he vehemently declared "and played the devil generally, in utter contempt of law and christianity. He said the night riders had not confined their outrages to their enemies, but had made warfare on the innocent, on those who knew nothing of their grievances, real or imaginary. He told how they shot into his own house, forcing him to lie down on the floor to escape their bullets, and that when he was almost a stranger in the town. He said such crimes as this were putting into motion forces roused by public sentiment that will destroy this wave of anarchy that is disgracing the State of Kentucky. The people will not submit to a reign of crime and terror. A courageous Governor will try his best to stop it.

If he fails martial law, will surely be invoked and the guilty will be arrested by Federal soldiers, condemned and shot. He described the horrors of martial law and said he had seen many a man tried and executed whom he believed was innocent. Martial law is awful, but it brings complete and lasting peace.

The night riders are fortunate in not becoming victims of retaliation. This is one of dangers they must face if they continue their career of crime. Then no man's property would be safe. He closed by upholding the good work of the Law and Order League, and spoke of the complete transformation in public opinion within the last sixty days. A thousand members were banded together and applications pouring in. Other towns were catching the spirit of the brave people of Hopkinsville. Versailles, Mt. Sterling, New Castle and other cities have formed leagues. The people of Hopkinsville are no longer afraid to talk. The sympathizers with lawlessness are out numbered ten to one and hundreds of determined and brave men are armed and equipped to fight for their homes, and see that no mob ever again catches the city napping. They will protect the city with their lives and let the world know that at least one city in Kentucky is now and forever on the side of law and order.

Dr. Means' discourse was strong, vigorous and outspoken. Such brave pulpit speakers as he, are needed in present crisis. Kentucky would be fortunate if it had such a "grand old man" in every pulpit in the State.

## BUILDINGS TO BE INSPECTED

Mayor Takes Action In The Matters of Fire Damages.

### SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Must Have no Fire Trap, Doors And Halls Must Be Safe.

Mayor Meacham has issued an order for a rigid inspection of the public halls and school buildings of the city by a committee composed of Chief of Police Ellis Roper, Fire Chief E. H. Hester and City Engineer B. F. McClaid. A report is to be submitted in five days, and steps will be taken at once to see that all exits have doors opening outward in the school rooms and that some adequate protection is provided against fire horrors similar to the one at Collinwood, O. The public halls must be provided with fire escapes and safe guards must be taken.

The white public school building have already been changed to make the doors open outward and Supt. Barksdale Hamlett is anticipating any regulations adopted by the Council.

The colored school building will be inspected and all needed alterations made.

The order applies to all theatres and public halls for both races.

## RAISING LICENSES

On all Lines of Business In Frankfort.

Merchants And Professional Men Must Help Out Revenues.

The city of Frankfort is getting hard up on the account of its bonded debt of \$400,000 and the council is preparing a general increase in licenses.

A general raise of 20 per cent. is added to all retail merchants' licenses in addition to which the following special raises are made; Saloon licenses raised to \$275; butchers' licenses to \$40; wholesale beer licenses to \$300; laundry license to \$33; coal company's license to \$50; livery stable's license to \$30; wholesale oil license to \$100; fire insurance company's license to \$75; life insurance company's license to \$25; attorney's license to \$12; physician's license to \$12; pool and billiard hall's to \$30 per table; skating rink license to \$300; moving picture show license to \$100.

In order that all of the interest affected may have a hearing on the matter, the Ordinance and License Committee will meet together on Monday afternoon for the purpose of hearing any complaints or arguments which those affected by this raise may desire to make. The ordinance committeemen believe that in fixing these licenses at the figures they have an equal distribution is made of the increased burden upon the city, and that no one business can set up the claim that it has been discriminated against.
