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GEN. WILLIAMS IN FULL CHARGE

Operating Now in Trigg County and Arrests to be Made.

TWO TRIGG CONVICTS.

Men Prosecuted for Perjury to Tell Their State's Evidence to Gov. Willson.

Frankfort, Ky., May 1. — Gen. Williams is in Trigg county now with a detachment of soldiers for the purpose of arresting the men who are accused of giving all the trouble in that district. No report from Gen. Williams had been received here by Gen. Johnston, although a message from him is likely to arrive at any time telling that a few, at least, of the men who have been accused of raiding Hopkinsville, Princeton, and invading Calloway county have been taken into camp by the soldiers. The information comes from Trigg county that there will be no trouble to find plenty of citizens who are willing to swear out the warrants, but so far as can be learned no warrants have been sworn out.

Gen. Williams, however, is acting on his own authority in the "dark patch," and is not being hampered with instructions of his superiors. Both Gov. Willson and Gen. Johnston have every confidence in Gen. Williams' ability to handle the situation in Trigg county. Where Gen. Williams will move to after he has completed his work in Trigg county is not known, but it is likely that he will go to Christian county, where there was a lot of night riding and intimidation last winter and during the spring.

The members of the Society of Equity who have their tobacco pooled deplore the necessity of sending the troops into Trigg county, but none of them more than Gen. Johnston himself, for it became known yesterday that Gen. Johnston himself is an Equity man, and has his 1906 crop of tobacco in the pool. So has M. C. Rankin, Commissioner of Agriculture.

Nathan Lassiter, indicted for night riding, was arrested Wednesday on Tennessee river, sixteen miles from here, by deputy sheriffs John Holland and Roy Edwards. Lassiter is

about the thirtieth man arrested for night riding in Calloway.

The examining trial of Louis Ethington, John Wood, George Ethington and James Stivers, farmers, charged with being members of the band of night riders that made a raid in the Elmburg neighborhood on the night of April 9, resulted in the accused men being discharged at Shelbyville.

Troops have been seen riding in Woodfort, Franklin and Henry county this week and state guns have been sent into Henry county.

Bowling Green Troops.

The Bowling Green News of Thursday contained this: "Capt. H. H. Denhardt, of Company 'A' of this city, has been notified to leave here with twenty or twenty-five picked men from the company and report to General Williams at Cadiz, in Trigg county, where it is alleged that night riders have been operating for several months past.

It is not known how long the boys will be gone, but in all probability for several weeks. Here is hoping and believing that they will do their duty."

Capt. Denhardt and his men were still in this city yesterday afternoon awaiting orders.

The twelve men charged with banding together to intimidate negroes employed at Center Furnace will be given an examining trial at Cadiz to-day by Judge Bingham. Max Hanbery has been employed by the defendants to represent them.

Dallas and Felix Winn, two alleged Calloway county night riders, were re-arrested Thursday on the charge of sending threatening letters. All of the 33 accused men, with the exception of three, have now been apprehended. Two have run off. The other is in hiding.

Walter Goodwin, of Lyon county, a messenger for the State troops on duty, who was arrested in that county recently and when searched found to have a revolver on his person and sentenced to ten days in jail, was pardoned by Gov. Willson.
