THE POWERS PARDON.

Gov. Willson has done the expected thing and pardoned the men convicted of the murder of Gov. Goebel. Caleb Powers was three times convicted and once given a sentence of death, but three times the Court of Appeals granted a new trial. The last trial resulted in a hung jury. Powers is pardoned before trial on this charge and is also freed from another indictment for perjury. Jim Howard, after two trials, was finally committed to the penitentiary two years ago on a life sentence. He is restored to citizenship and liberty, to go back to the mountains and answer to another old murder indictment. It has been understood for months that Gov. Willson would turn these men loose upon the State, political reasons making it imperative upon him to do so. Powers was expected to attend the Chicago convention and be lionized, but he announces that he will go to Barboursville and remain in the seclusion of the mountains until he recovers from the effects of his confinement. Howard has gone to Louisville and one report is that he has been converted and will become a missionary in the mountains.

Gov. Willson has lost the good opinion of many Democrats by interfering at this particular time with the processes of law in punishing crime. It lays him open to a charge of inconsistency and shows that even the best of Republican Governors cannot rise above partisanship.

The report of Commissioner M. C. Rankin for June gives a list of the creameries and canning factories in Kentucky. There are 45 creameries and 31 canning factories. The report is much more voluminous than heretofore. There are special reports from about two-thirds of the counties in the State. The report from Christian says: "Farmers stopped planting corn to plant tobacco and a large part of the crop is planted. Too much rain for wheat and for cultivating corn. Gardens are very good. Strawberries fine."

The joint debate in Clarksville Saturday between Carmack and Patterson drew a large crowd in spite of the rain. The Patterson men claim that the Governor scored a big triumph in Clarksville. The contest closes June 27th.

Bryan now has twenty-five more votes than are necessary to nominate on the first ballot.

Cutting in Trigg.

Meagre reports of a cutting affray in Trigg county Saturday night have been received, in which Buck Shoat was badly cut across the ribs and also about the neck by Alias Overbey. The trouble occurred in the Caledonia neighborhood over a team.

At Birmingham, T. Luther Birchfield shot Mrs. W. A. Van Hooser and then shot himself. Both died shortly afterward.

TWO MINUTE SKETCHES

Benjamin Franklin.

He went without lunches to have more time to read.

To improve his style as a writer Benjamin Franklin as a boy read passages from Addison's Spectator, then two or three days later tried to reproduce them. He was careful not to memorize the language, but only fixed the thought in his mind, then by comparing his own language with the original was enabled to discover the defects in his style.

To improve his conduct Franklin made out a list of the cardinal virtues, then marked down any infraction of them during each day. He also adopted early in life a set of simple rules for his guidance.

In youth Franklin happened to read Xenophon's description of the Socratic method, and it made a lasting impression on his mind. He decided to drop the dogmatic way of making statements and to follow the plan of the wise-old Athenian. To this habit of asking questions and making suggestive and tentative statements rather than being self assertive and positive Franklin ascribed much of his later success as a writer and diplomat.

He ran away from Boston while a mere stripling, yet before he left he had read every book on which he could lay his hands. He even went without his lunches with the twofold object of having more time in which to read and of having more money to spend for books.

Franklin's first notable success was with "Poor Richard's Almanac," the quaint and wise sayings in which attained immediate and worldwide popularity and were translated into almost every known tongue.

In Franklin's electrical experiments, especially the famous one with the kite, he endangered his life, yet so intent was he on discovering the truth that he seemed utterly indifferent to personal peril.

Franklin's moral courage was shown nowhere more than in his treatment of his illegitimate son, William. He took the boy to live in his own home and introduced him everywhere as his son, both in America and Europe.

SKULL CRUSHED.

Body of Negro Found Near Railroad Track.

John Ware, colored, aged 25 years, was found dead by the L. & N., railroad track near Salubria Saturday night about 10 o'clock. Ware was in Pembroke about twenty or thirty minutes before his body was found. It is said that he had been drinking. He left town and was walking up the railroad when last seen alive. His skull was crushed and his body badly bruised.

The Coroner held an inquest and the jury returned a verdict to the effect that he came to his death, supposedly, by being struck by a train.
