## BURNING WHISKY SET RIVER AFIRE

Midway Has \$5,000,000 Incendiary Conflagration.

## WHOLE CITY IN DANGER

Greatest Fire That Has Ever Been Seen in a Kentucky Town.

Midway, Ky., Aug. 7.—Five warehouse, and 47,500 barrels of whisky owned by the S. J. Greenbaum Distilling Company of Louisville, were destroyed by fire early Wednesday night. The loss is estimated at between \$4,000,000 and \$5,000,000. Over 2,500,000 gallons of whisky were destroyed and is partly covered by insurance.

The burning whisky ran into Elkhorn creek and the creek was ablaze for miles. Several bridges were burned and all fish in the flaming portion of the creek were killed.

The fire was of incendiary origin. The fire was seen for fifty miles. The sky being a brilliant red.

The flames, as they coursed down the surface of the creek, destroyed the Southern railroad trestle, which spans it, along with half a dozen negro cabins.

The government loss in constructive taxes by the Greenbaum distillery fire at Midway will aggregate nearly \$2,500,000. There were 2,000,000 gallons of whisky in the burned warehouse, on which the Government tax was \$1.10 a gallon.

## NIGHT RIDER TRIALS ON

One Called Thursday With Three Defendants Tried Jointly.

## JOE BELL COMES NEXT.

Jury Was Not Made Up Until Yesterday Morning Early.

Paducah, Ky., Aug. 7.—The cases of Jake Ellis, Henry Taylor and William McClure, charged with visiting the home of Mose Thornton and threatening him if he did not put his tobacco in the association, were called at Murry yesterday afternoon. The defense in the case of Jake Ellis did not have all the witnesses present yesterday morning. The jury is now being selected.

Yost & Laffoon, of Madisonville, supposed to have been employed to defend the men, are not in the case, and J. C. Speight, of Mayfield, and F. F. Acree, of Murray, are conducting the defense.

The trial of Joe Bell, who was arrested while receiving notes, slipped by men arrested on the charge of being night riders at the county jail, will be called to-day.

Judge Wells said that the prosecution has new evidence and some confessions that will prove surprises. The last two jurors were secured this morning.

## INSTITUTE WORK HAS CLOSED

Adjourned Yesterday Afternoon After Five Days.

### DR. KINNAMON'S TALK.

Attendance Was Largest Ever Recorded and Excellent Work Was Done.

The County Institute of teachers closed its session of five days yesterday afternoon and adjourned. The chief feature of the week was Dr. A. J. Kinnamon's free lecture at the court house Thursday night on the subject "Advantages of a Higher Education." A large crowd was present and the speaker's address was given a close and attentive hearing and was well received.

Yesterday morning the institute was opened with an address by Miss Westcott, on educational work in general.

Dr. Kinnamon delivered an address at 11 o'clock along the same line, touching upon many phases of the teacher's work.

In the afternoon Dr. Kinnamon discussed the Normal School work, particularly the Bowling Green school, of which he is Dean.

Mrs. Chas. P. Weaver, wife of the former Mayor of Louisville, arrived Thursday in the interest of school improvement, and that afternoon discussed the organization of a school improvement League before the institute, and a general discussion of the subject followed. The purpose of the League is to secure better schools, better houses, better locations and to create a healthier sentiment among the people for improved schools.

Three more teachers were enrolled Thursday, bringing the total up to 97. This is the largest attendance of teachers in the history of institute work in the county.

The attendance of the public was also very gratifying every day. Dr. Kinnamon and Miss Westcott, as instructors, gave universal satisfaction. Prof. C. E. Dudley, of Pembroke, as musical director, contributed much to the success of the meetings. Prof. W. E. Gray, county superintendent, made a most efficient head and general manager.

The last address was at 2 o'clock on sanitation, by Dr. J. N. McCormack, of the State Board of Health.

An improvement League was organized and Committees appointed, which will meet at the City Court room next Friday afternoon at three o'clock. Mrs. S. A. Edmunds is chairman of the Committee on Constitution and by-laws.

## MAD DOG BITE PROVES FATAL

Will S. Allen Dies of Hydrophobia After Pasteur Treatment.

### BITTEN NOV. 6TH, 1907.

Married Last Winter and Left This City for Wynn, Arkansas.

News was received here yesterday that Will S. Allen formerly of this city, had died yesterday morning, of hydrophobia, at Wynn, Arkansas.

Allen, while living here last fall, was attacked Nov. 6, by a rabid dog owned by Dr. Keith, which lacerated his face fearfully, exposing an artery. He was taken to the Pasteur Institute in Chicago by Dr. J. E. Stone, and remained there three weeks, being apparently cured. The physician told Dr. Stone that

Allen's case was one of the worst he had ever treated and the cure might not be permanent. He remained a week longer than is usual. The same dog bit Mrs. John W. Mitchell very slightly, one tooth scratching her shoulder. She also went to the same institute and after a stay of two weeks was pronounced perfectly immune and permanently cured. She has had no further trouble. The news of Allen's death came as a surprise. Last winter he married a young lady in Nashville and had been lost sight of, until Dr. Stone received a telegram from his physician yesterday.

### TUBERCULOSIS

Causes Death of Mrs. Annie Berry.

Mrs. Annie Berry, wife of Aught Berry, who resides about five miles east of the city, died Wednesday, after an illness of several months, of tuberculosis. She was about thirty years old, and, besides her husband, leaves two children, one of them only nine months old.
