

INCORPORATED FOR \$25,000

Planters' Lumber Company Files Articles With County Clerk.

TWO HUNDRED SHARES.

Plant to Be Connected With Illinois Central By Rail.

Articles of Incorporation of the Planter's Lumber Company have been filed with the county clerk. The amount of authorized capital stock of the corporation is \$25,000, divided into two hundred shares of \$100 each. The incorporators are Messrs. Odie Davis, Lee Oldham and W. S. Barnett. Similar articles were filed by the incorporators at Madisonville, where the gentlemen are also operating a plant, but the principle place of business will be in this city. The nature of the business will be the buying, selling and manufacturing of lumber and all kinds of building material, operating planing mills and saw mills and the buying and selling of timbered lands, also the contracting for the erection of buildings.

The plant is located on Tenth avenue, west, where the firm began business several weeks ago. Already a fine trade has been established, much beyond expectations, and it was decided to incorporate.

In a few days a survey will be made for a half-mile track, connecting the plant by rail with the I. C. road and the work of grading will then be begun and will be completed within sixty days. Ample facilities will thus be afforded for handling a much larger volume of business.

PRISONERS SENTENCED.

Circuit Court Will Adjourn To-Day After Final Hearing.

Circuit court is winding up the business of the term hearing minor matters in equity, and will adjourn today.

Yesterday the prisoners were sentenced.

Arthur Wilson, convicted of rape, was sentenced to be hanged June 25. Wilson's stoicism gave way and he was much agitated while the sentence was being given. He said he didn't get a fair trial, as the attorney he had employed and paid failed to represent him and his witnesses were not present.

The following parties, all colored, convicted at the present term, were sentenced, as follows: Cleveland Cowherd, breaking into dwelling, one year; Sank Dickerson, malicious striking, two years; Morton Cox, hog stealing, two years; Lucien Poston and Neal Pendleton, house breaking, 2 1/2 years each; Archie Bronaugh, malicious shooting, 2 years. They will be taken to Eddyville either tomorrow or the next day.

ARBOR DAY YESTERDAY

Fittingly Observed By Exercises at All Of the Schools.

WAS ALSO BIRD DAY.

Large Crowds Attended the Meetings, Held at 2:15 P. M.

Yesterday was the day set apart by Gov. Willson as Arbor Day for Kentucky and it proved to be a fine day for planting trees. The day was observed by the public schools of the city at 2:15 o'clock, when highly interesting exercises were held at all of the school buildings in the city. A large number of citizens accepted invitations to attend these exercises.

Arbor Day was first instituted 16 years ago by Secretary Morton, during Cleveland's administration, and many States have taken up the idea.

Yesterday was also Bird Day, and the school children did not overlook this feature in their exercises.

At the West Side School, the children marched around the grounds to the tune "Columbia." An address of welcome was made by Arthur Anderson. Several songs were given, one by eight little girls dressed in white with red hats, representing poppies. A recitation was given by George Means.

A chorus of 20 boys sang "Listen to the Mocking Bird."

Six boys planted a tree in the yard and in conclusion Mrs. Moss, the principal, read the following poem:
