Five great services have been held in the Yeuell meetings since the last report and thirty-one persons were added to the Second Avenue Christian church on Sunday.

Saturday night Mr. Yeuell lectured on "Simon Peter and Judas Iscariot." The lecture was profusely and splendidly illustrated with stereopticon views which are expensive copies of the masterpieces in European galleries. The views were probably the best ever exhibited here. As to Mr. Yeuell's lecture, it was as radiant as the glorious pictures themselves. Next Saturday night Mr. Yeuell gives another and on the Saturday night following still another of these great lectures. No specific charge is made for admission to the lecture, but a silver offering, i. e., any sum from ten cents up is expected from each person who attends.

Sunday's services were attended by large audiences, that of Sunday night overflowing the big auditorium. Mr. Yeuell proved himself as versatile as his fame had reported him. Humor, wit, exposition, word painting and noble enthusiasm characterized his addresses. He spoke to children at 9:30 a. m., to the church at 10:45 a. m., to women at 3 p. m., and to a mighty mass meeting at night. He was absolute master of these assemblies, imparting his spirit of zest and fiery interest to his hearers in an astounding way. Prof. Faust sang with power at the services of Sunday and conducted his chorus with skill.

**Dies And Remains Interred At Pembroke.**

Dr. B. M. Trabue died of paralysis at his home in Allensville last Thursday night. He was 81 years old but continued the practice of his profession until he was taken ill two weeks ago. He leaves a wife and eight children. Among them Mack Trabue and Mrs. Bland of Pembroke. The remains were brought to Pembroke and interred Saturday.

**STREET ORDINANCES**

**Occupied Most of the Time at Council Meeting.**

The city council met Friday night and passed several ordinances. The dog ordinance of 1908 was re-enacted for 1909, to take effect July 1. The tags can be bought any time before July 1, as Chief Roper now has them on hand.

The pavement ordinances east side of Liberty street and for Fourteenth avenue were given their second passage.

Several bills were allowed, among them one for Layne & Mason, \$210 for a horse for the fire department, and Downer Bros. \$26.50 for shade trees for cemetery.

An ordinance putting down a five foot pavement on West side of Elm street, concrete where the curbing has not already been set, was given its first passage.

The application of Lewis Leavell for permission to move a house through the streets was referred to the Building Committee with power to act.

An ordinance was introduced repealing ordinance No. 36, passed last year, changing street names, but action was postponed until Friday, May 7.

Mayor Meacham was authorized to appoint election officers for the school election to be held Saturday, May 1.

### CONTESTS IN TWO WARDS

Have Arisen in Races For Councilmen in This City.

**THIRD AND FOURTH.**

In Other Five Wards Sitting Members Have No Announced Opposition.

Quite a buzz in city politics was created last week by several announcements for city councilman in the various wards.

In the Fourth ward a numerously signed call upon Mr. W. A. Long was published Friday and Mr. A. W. Wood was on the same day formally announced as a candidate in the same ward.

In the Third ward Mr. N. A. Barnett has formally announced and Mr. Herbert L. Haydon published a card declaring his purpose to permit the use of his name in the same ward.

In the Second ward a call was circulated and signed by practically everybody in the ward calling upon Councilman John B. Galbreath to stand for re-election and he has consented to do so and will have no opposition.

The same course was pursued in the Sixth ward and a big majority of the votes have called upon Councilman Geo. E. Randle to run again and no opposition has developed to him.

In the First ward Councilman E. H. Higgins will ask an endorsement and there are no indications that it will not be accorded him without opposition.

In the Seventh ward Councilman E. H. Armstrong has not formally announced, but he has no opposition so far and it is not known that he will have any.

The council to be elected this fall will have the election of all of the city officers for terms ranging from one year for policemen to four years for mayor and city judge.

**Aged Lady Dead.**

Mrs. Minerva Martin, an aged lady who resided several miles northeast of the city, on the Kirkmansville road, died last Thursday night. She was 78 years old. The interment took place in the Martin burying ground Friday.
