## KENTUCKY'S NEW CAPITOL WILL BE DEDICATED TO-DAY

Twenty Thousand People  
Expected to Be Present  
at Frankfort to Wit-  
ness Ceremonies.

Frankfort, Ky., June 2.—Kentucky \$2,000,000 Capitol is in gala attire, ready for the ceremony of dedication, which will occupy the entire day of Thursday, June 2, and attract to Frankfort some twenty thousand enthusiastic citizens of the Commonwealth desirous to participate in an event of such historic interest.

The residents of the Little Capital City have been working for weeks to make the affair a grand success. Already the public and principal buildings have been decked in flags and bunting. Everybody is on the off-reception committee, and hundreds are preparing to entertain guests in their homes during the affair. State and local officials and the leading business men of the city have secured special trains and low rates from all the surrounding territory, and schedules so arranged that the big crowd will be handled without inconvenience to the visitors, and that they may be enabled to get away from home in the late afternoon and early evening. For those who will remain over night a big reception in the new Capitol has been arranged.

The principal addresses of the day will be delivered by Gov. A. E. Wilson and Senator W. O. Bradley.

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### RAILROAD HARD HIT.


Louisville & Nashville Must Pay \$28,000 Judgment.

The case of Spencer E. Melton against the L. & N. has been affirmed by the U. S. Supreme court with costs, which judgment, interest and costs amount to \$28,000.

Melton was injured while constructing a coal tippie near Howell

Ind. in 1905, and suit was filed in Hopkins County resulting in a judgment for \$28,000 which was affirmed by the Court of Appeals. The case was then taken to the U. S. Supreme Court. The point involved was the Indiana Employers' liability Statute as applied to persons outside of the train service.
