Order Made For Grading Dover Road From Herndon to LaFayette.

## SIXTEEN FOOT PIKE.

Additional Rock Quarries Needed For Construction of Pikes.

Pursuant to a call by the County Judge Fiscal Court met in this city Thursday and transacted considerable business.

An order was made for the road supervisor to proceed to grade the road from Herndon to Lafayette and place same in suitable condition for a sixteen-foot pike.

Justice M. J. Cooper and Mr. W. T. Vaughan were appointed a committee to procure additional rock quarries to be used in construction of this pike and also for the pike from C. E. Sibley's gate, on the Palmyra road, to the Bell road, near Howell. E. W. Coleman, county road supervisor, was authorized to appoint a general overseer for the work now being done on the roads. An order was made for the construction of a four-room cottage on the Poor farm to used by the keeper.

Court adjourned to meet again Friday, July 1.

## CAVE UP TO THE POLICE

Little Rock, Ark., June 23.—M. A. Hammock, of Pembroke, Christian county, Ky., surrendered to the local police, voluntarily, to face a charge of forgery, declaring that he was conscience stricken because he had forged a check last March at Evansville Ind.

Last March, Hammock forged the name of his brother, H. F. Hammock, of Pembroke, to a check for \$50, drawn on the National Bank of Pembroke, he told the officers to whom he surrendered. He cashed the check at the Old National Bank of Evansville.

## TARIFF INCREASED ON TOBACCO

Bureau of Internal Revenue Issues New Schedule Effective July 1.

## NEW CLASS OF DEALERS

Revised Regulations Contain Complete Record of Existing Law.

Washington, June 23.—Revised regulations concerning the tax on tobacco, snuff, cigars and cigarettes and the purchase and sale of leaf tobacco have been issued by the internal revenue bureau. The Payne-Aldrich tariff law made an increase in taxes on various lines of tobacco and snuff products, but provided they should not go into effect until July 1 of this year. This was to give dealers who had large contracts outstanding ample time to prepare for the change.

The new regulations contain a complete record of interpretations of existing law on every branch of the tobacco industry and of a detailed mass of information important to manufacturers and dealers in tobacco down to the man who peddles the manufactured product on steamboats and steam cars.

Section 35 of the tariff act provides for a new class of tobacco dealers, viz., retail dealers in leaf tobacco, whose privileges are specifically defined.

Packages of five and ten cigars, weighing more than three pounds per 1,000, and packages containing five, eight or fifteen little cigars, weighing not more than three pounds per 1,000, and cigarettes in addition to those now in use are authorized. Caution notices hitherto required to be affixed to wooden boxes by pasting on labels may hereafter be either attached by each a label or imprinted or indented into the wood itself.
