WITH GOVERNOR

To Grant Conditional Pardons or Respites.

Frankfort, Ky., July 20.—Attorney General Breathitt has furnished Gov. Wilson with a written opinion to the effect that the chief executive has full authority, under the constitution, to grant conditional pardons, respites or respites, to convicted criminals and to provide for their return to confinement in the event they violate the terms under which they are given freedom.

The attorney general reviews the laws on the subject in a fifteen-page opinion, and commends the plan as "a wise one and calculated to result in great good."

GETS \$340,000 FORTUNE.

Mayfield Bricklayer Inherits Mother's Estate.

Mayfield, Ky., July 20.—No longer will Robert Overshine, of this city, call down from a third story staging for "more brick."

He's rich now; his mother died in Elizabeth City, N. J., last week and left him \$340,000.

Overshine doffed his overalls to-day and declared that he'd never again slap mortar on a brick. With his newly acquired fortune he says he wont need the \$3 per day that Mayfield bricklayers get.

Tonight Overshine treated all of his friends, and bade them good-bye. He boarded a train, west bound, and said his future address would be California. He plans to buy a ranch and watch others work for him.

PITCHFORK STUCK HIM.

Prosperous Farmer's Son is Dying From Wound.

Glasgow, Ky., July 20.—Hughie, the fourteen-year-old son of J. T. Worthington, a well known farmer of the Coral Hill section, is reported to be dying from having a pitchfork pierce his bowels today.

He was riding on a load of hay when the wagon was overturned. In falling he struck a pitchfork which was on the hay, the fork piercing the body.

CREAM CONES.

Manufacturers to be Prosecuted by Government.

Prosecutors against manufacturers of ice cream cones containing borax are to be instituted by the Government under the pure food law.

Large seizure of cones were made recently in different parts of the country by Inspectors of the Department of Agriculture. Analysis of the cones seized disclosed the presence of borax, a property which has been held to be deleterious to the human stomach.

Only Eight Days.

Elkton, Ky., July 21.—Of the sixty four indictments returned by the July term of the Circuit Court, just ended, thirty-nine are for the illegal sale of liquor. It was the shortest term in the ninety-one years of the county's history, lasting only eight days. But one civil case was tried before a jury.

Remarkable Showing.

Louisville, Ky., July, 20.—The Louisville & Nashville Railroad continues to make a remarkable showing for the new fiscal year. For the second week of July the increase over last year was \$95,470, and for the two weeks it has been \$179,640.

Struck By Lightning.

While he was making a cross country flight at Barcelona, Spain, Aviator Ehrmann's aeroplane was struck by lightning and fell blazing to the ground. The aviator escaped uninjured, which is regarded almost miraculous.

STENOGRAPHERS

Of The Fair Sex Are to Be Replaced By Men.

Washington, July 22.—Women stenographers apparently are no longer wanted in the government service. This announcement was made today at a meeting of the civil service commission.

Practically all the various departments of the government are seeking to replace the women stenographers with men, on the ground that the latter are more amenable to discipline.

AFTER VAGRANTS.

Madisonville to Make it Hot For Idlers.

Madisonville, Ky., July 22.—The City Council has passed an ordinance providing a fine of \$10 and 30 days' imprisonment for vagrants upon conviction for the first offense. Upon the second and all subsequent convictions sixty days' imprisonment is provided. Any one fined under the ordinance shall be required to work at hard labor. All idlers must go to work and unless they do so or leave the city they will be liable to arrest.

LIP AND LEG DISEASE.

U. S. Inspector Lincoln Suggests Some Remedies.

In regard to the disease peculiar to sheep known as the lip and leg disease, Dr. W. B. Lincoln, United States Inspector, says that the usual sheep dip used for scabies will prove effective for a preventative, but where the infection attacks the inside of the lip or mouth, he would recommend any of the coal tar preparations as a remedy, in all cases to be applied by hand. These preparations may be purchased of dealers in any city.

TALKS OF LIFE OF DESERT

European Who Lived Long Among Arabs Describes Daily Routine of His Hosts.

"By living with the Arabs, doing as they did and moving with them in their migrations," writes Douglas Carruthers in the Geographical Journal, "I obtained an insight into their mode of life and customs. Things move slowly in the east and I spent 14 days in buying three camels! But the time was not wasted. I studied Arab manners, learned more or less how to eat with my hands and how to wear Arab costume with some comfort, how to drink coffee a la Arab, and, most difficult of all, how to sit all day long doing nothing. I found this last most trying, more especially because it was cold; a Bedouin tent is a drafty place at the best, but in midwinter it is almost unbearable. On two occasions there was snow on the desert. We used to feed out of a huge round dish, ten of us at a time. The fare was camels' milk and bread in the morning and in the evening we generally had meat and rice, cooked with an enormous amount of fat. During the day we appeased our hunger by sipping strong black coffee. At night there was always a large group of men in the tent of the sheik and talk was carried on far into the night. Eloquence is a highly prized talent among the Bedouins and not only would they recount their stories in the most beautiful manner, but on occasion, to the tune of a single-stringed violin, they would sing extempore songs for hours on end."
