SAMSON OUTSAMSONED

Biblical Giant Was Not as  
Strong as Arthur Saxon.

From Berlin, Germany, comes a  
man, Arthur Saxon by name, who  
declares he is stronger than Samson.  
He admits he never tore a lion to  
pieces, but he can lie on his back  
and support with his feet a plank  
on which sit thirteen men, while  
with his hands he supports three  
more men and a 300-pound dumb-  
bell.

Saxon is one of a trio of brothers  
who have amazed all Europe. Scien-  
tists traveled from many cities to  
examine them. Without exception  
they pronounced the German giants  
the strongest men on earth. In  
New York City they gave a test be-  
fore a party of professors and phys-  
ical culture experts. The official  
judges and weighers were Gilman  
Lowe, editor of Health Magazine;  
Herbert M. Lome, editor of Physi-  
cal Culture, and Professors A. F.  
Schmidt and H. W. Titus. The  
strong men made no special efforts,  
yet they broke every world's record  
for lifting and supporting weights.

Arthur Saxon lifted high above  
his head with his right hand a bar  
bell weighing 312 pounds. The  
judges were amazed. He had broken  
a world's record. Louis Cyr, a Can-  
adian, for twenty years held the  
world's championship for a lift of  
this kind. His lift was only 273  
pounds.

"I suppose I have demonstrated  
to your satisfaction that I am the  
strongest man on earth," said Sax-  
on. He was assured that his claim  
could not be denied. "However,"  
he continued, "I'd like you to see a  
real lift—one that is worth while."  
With one hand the brawny German  
lifted a 374-pound dumbbell high  
above his head. Again he used but  
one hand.

Arthur Saxon by profession is a  
sculptor. His handiwork adorns  
the masonry of many of Germany's  
public buildings. He is a vegetarian  
and has never tasted alcohol. He is  
a graduate of the University at  
Leipzig. With his two brothers,  
who are almost as strong as he, he  
was induced to come to America by  
the Ringling Brothers. This trio of  
strength is now one of the features  
of the world's greatest shows. It  
will be seen in Hopkinsville when  
the big circus comes on Saturday,  
Oct. 1.

backs, form the under structure of  
a heavy bridge, over which passes  
an automobile with six passengers.

CONTEST ELECTION  
OF HINDS IN MAINE

Examination of Ballots in  
First District Demanded.

Portland, Me., Sept. 15.—Notice  
has been served on the clerks of the  
cities and towns of the first district  
that request will be made for an ex-  
amination of the ballots in behalf of  
William M. Pennell, Democratic  
candidate for congress against Ash-  
er C. Hinds, Republican. Unofficial  
returns give Mr. Hinds a plurality  
of 703.

Returns from remote towns of  
the fourth district showed the re-  
election of Frank E. Guernsey, Re-  
publican. In the second and third  
districts Daniel McGillicuddy and  
Samuel W. Gould won decisively.

The joint session of the legisla-  
ture will be Democratic by 111 to 69,  
assuring a Democratic senator to  
succeed Senator Hale.
