JUST AS WAS EXPECTED

The First Batch of Defendants In Cooper Case Acquitted.

OUTSIDE JURY FOR NEXT

Commonwealth's Attorney Smith made Out a Strong Case Against Them.

Eddyville, Ky., Dec. 14.—After being out since Monday the jury in the case of Bart Creekmur, Alonzo Gray, Jim Bozarth and Bryan Hawkins, charged with being accessories after the fact of the murder of Axiom Cooper, returned a verdict of "not guilty," yesterday.

The four men were alleged to have been implicated in the killing which took place at Lamasco, in this county, last July. Cooper was an employe of Milton Oliver, who was the star witness against the night riders. An attempt was made to assassinate Oliver and the shooting of Cooper occurred some time later at a picnic. It was decided to set the cases of Roy Merrick, Fraud Murphey, "Spunk" Creekmur and Vilas Mitchell, charged with Cooper's murder, for Wednesday, and, upon motion of the commonwealth, a jury will be summoned from McCracken county.

In making his final appeal for the conviction of the four men who have been on trial, Commonwealth's Attorney Smith said he hoped the fact that soldiers were here would not weigh upon the mind of the jurors, as they were only on hand to pre-

serve order. It is thought it was decided to summon the McCracken county jury for the next trial for this reason.

NOTED WOMAN DEAD

Mrs. Leann S. King Passes Away at Denver.

Denver, Col., Dec. 12.—Mrs. Leann S. King, widow of former Lieut. Governor John Quincy Adams King, of Kentucky, died here Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. N. K. Bagnell. Death was due to complications arising from old age. She was eighty years old.

Mrs. King, who was born in Burkesville, Ky., was a member of a noted family. She was the daughter of Alfred E. King, of Revolutionary fame, and a cousin of Rufus King, Vice President of the United States during the administration of James Fillmore. She had lived in Denver for the last thirty-five years. Mrs. John G. Brooks, of Paducah, Ky., a daughter, and Dr. Brooks, were at the bedside.

NUDE MEN AND WOMEN

Snowball Each Other Over a High Fence.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 14.—Seven men and three women, as devoid of raiment as on the day of their birth, wallowed and rolled in the snow in a back yard at Evanston in the belief that they will renew their youth.

The women were separated from the men by an eight foot board fence, over which they tossed snow balls at each other.

The institution where this heroic method of assisting nature in thwarting Father Time's advances is known as the Kosmos Physical Culture sanitarium, and the "cure"—the "first aid to nature."

Dr. Henry E. Lane, who conducts the sanitarium, is well known on the north side of Chicago, where he ran a similar place until he was forced to leave because of the criticisms of his neighbors.

The snow cure is combined with the sun cure, and in both treatments Dr. Lane insists on nudity. When he started his sanitarium in Evanston he had a five foot fence built around the back yard, but was forced by the police to add two feet more to it, making it seven feet high. The partition between the two inclosures is a foot higher.

There are ten patients in the sanitarium, Dr. Lane says, but he refuses to divulge their names. The youngest is 45 years old and the oldest 65.
