## CONSTRUCTION CAMP TRAGEDY

### Negro Cook Shot And Instantly Killed at Early Hour Sunday.

#### AN INQUEST WAS HELD.

### Victim Said to Have Been Shooting Promiscuously Before Being Slain.

John Brown, col., aged about forty years, was shot and almost instantly killed in the Mason & Hanger construction camp, about half a mile south of Empire at an early hour Sunday morning. Dr. J. H. Rice held an inquest on the body Sunday and the jury returned a verdict to the effect that Brown came to his death, in their opinion, as a result of a pistol shot fired in the hands of Jess Shanklin, another negro.

Brown was shot in the right chest. The testimony showed that two shots were fired, but only one ball took effect, causing death in a few minutes.

It seems that there had been considerable disorderly conduct among some of the negroes during the night, in which Brown indulged, and it is claimed that the latter was firing his pistol promiscuously when he was shot.

No arrest has yet been made.

The victim of the shooting had been employed in the camp as a cook for some time and was not a native of this county.

#### GREAT SUFFERER.

##### Mrs. Hill Passes Away After Long Illness.

Mrs. Mary E. Hill died Saturday at her home about three miles northeast of Gracey, aged 75 years. She had been in declining health for about four years and was confined to her bed for two years with muscular rheumatism. Several children survive. The interment took place in the Duguid burying ground Sunday.

## OVER 140 GIRLS LOSE LIVES

### Horrible Holocaust In A New York City Factory.

#### MANY LEAP TO DEATH

### Worst Disaster Around New York Since Burning of The Gen. Slocum.

New York, March 27.—One of the worst disasters around New York since the burning of the steamer General Slocum was a fire Saturday afternoon in a ten story building at Washington Place and Green street, in which over 140 persons, mostly young girls and women, lost their lives. The victims were employes, of the Triangle Waist Company. Most of them leaped to death from the eighth, ninth and tenth stories of the building. Many were suffocated while at work at the machines, while others were crushed to death from leaping down an elevator shaft.

#### MOUNTAIN METHODS.

##### Sharpshooters Are Killing Q. & C. Strike-breakers.

Somerset, Ky., March 25.—The second assassination within three days in connection with the strike of white firemen on the Queen and Crescent route occurred Thursday afternoon at Helenwood, Tenn., when C. B. Street, a fireman working as a strike-breaker, was shot from ambush.

The injured man was hurried to Somerset, where he died late as a result of his wounds. Street's home address was given the company as New York city.

On Tuesday afternoon Oscar Patch a Chicago detective guarding the strike-breaking firemen, was shot from ambush and instantly killed near Junction City, just south of Danville. Both Patch and Street were accompanying the freight train crews.


