IMMENSE LEDGE SHATTERED.

Fifteen Hundred Pounds of Dynamite Exploded in Kentucky.

Lexington, Ky., July 5.—Owing to elaborate precautions only one man was injured when 1,500 pounds of dynamite were exploded in a limestone ledge on the railroad extension work between Carter City and Hazard, Ky., late yesterday. The ledge, which was a quarter of a mile long, was shattered into fragments. Warned by railroad officials, most of the residents of Carter City left their homes and took refuge in caves in the mountains.
