FLYING HIGHER THAN BIRDS

Amazing Altitude That Was Reached in an Aeroplane by the Frenchman, Garros.

The Frenchman, Garros, established a truly amazing record for altitude in an aeroplane when he ascended 13,943 feet. Think of a man's "winging his way," as it were, to a height considerably over two miles above the solid earth. The skylark is popularly esteemed the highest flyer of the common birds, yet he mounts no more than a mile, whence he pours forth his liquid notes to charm the ear of an ordinary mortal and a vaken responsive song in a Shelley. Pike's Peak is but 14,147 feet above sea level and scarcely more than 8,000 feet above the plateau where Colorado Springs rests in its beauty and wealth among the lesser ranges of the Rocky mountains. Garros, by ascending to an altitude almost equal to that at which venturesome visitors find the Masonic monument on the top of Pike's Peak, surpassed Lincoln Beachey's record at Chicago by 2,365 feet, a space that itself would have filled the whole world with wonder less than three years ago.—Philadelphia Press.

HUNTING THE POLAR BEAR

Exciting Bit of Description of Sport on the Ice Fields of the Arctic.

ONE MORE AMERICAN TRIUMPH

Statement Made That Physicians Have Succeeded in Eradicating Beri-Beri.

Another great victory for the army medical officers has been scored in the Philippines in the eradication of beri-beri. During the first five months of the present year there was but one case of this disease among the Philippine soldiers. It is now considered practically nonexistent among native soldiers. There were but five admissions to hospitals during the year just past as compared with 839 in 1909 and 189 in 1910. The Filipino ration is the same as that used in 1908 and 1909, with the exception that unpolished rice has been used and the amount limited to 16 ounces. It is considered that this is the key to the situation and that another year will entirely wipe up this disease. The use of unpolished rice and the reduction in quantity are considered sufficient in themselves to prevent the occurrence of beri-beri. The polished rice theory of beri-beri production is fully sustained by the figures of the past year and reflects great credit to the medical officers of the army in their successful campaign against this tropical disease.

PROTECTING WILD ANIMALS.

An important amendment to the game laws which goes into effect this year is that prohibiting the sale of game at any time. While this will have no effect on the average hunter, it will put an end to a practice which has had much to do with decreasing the supply of wild animals and birds in this state. The slaughter of game in order to supply the markets has in the past done much to aid in the extinction of our wild animals and birds, and the elimination of this type of hunter will be most beneficial.

Each year the game laws are being more strictly enforced, and the protectors have obtained a large number of convictions. The officials are no longer ready to overlook violations of the law, but are making every effort to put a stop to illegal hunting. And in this work they have the moral support of all good citizens of the state.—Schenectady Gazette.

INTERESTING EVENTS IN CHICAGO. NINETEENTH NATIONAL IRRIGATION CONGRESS

DECEMBER 5 TO 9.

The object and purpose of this Congress can best be expressed in its motto, "Save the forests, store the floods, reclaim the deserts, make homes on the land," to which might be added "drain the swamp and make homes on the land."

There are in the United States 75,000,000 acres of swamp land, non-productive, a menace to health, and a deterrent to immigration. 75,000,000 acres divided into 40-acre farms means homes for 1,875,000 families, or approximately 10,000,000 of our citizenship. This land when reclaimed will be as healthful as land that has always been dry, and will be the most productive of all lands, because it is composed of the rich soil brought down by the rivers, deposited and mixed with the decayed vegetation for centuries.

On account of the diversified ownership and state complications it would seem that the United States Government is logically the authority to redeem these lands along the lines pursued in the reclamation of the arid lands of the West.

The results of irrigation of the arid lands of the Far West, and the possibilities of the drainage of the swamp lands of the Great South, and elsewhere, will be given particular attention in an elaborate program that has been planned for this congress. Delegates from all parts of the country, as well as foreign representatives, have been invited, and a goodly attendance is expected. Land Show, Nov. 18 to Dec. 9.
