

SCAL COURT.

January Meeting Held Tuesday
And Considerable Business Transacted.

E. W. Colman Relected Road
Supervisor--J.W. Richards
Chosen Commissioner for
Sheriff's Settlement.

The January meeting of the Fiscal Court was held Tuesday. An appropriation of \$650 was made to the Poor Commissioner for the purpose of paying balance of his salary and the rest for the pauper fund.

John W. Richards was appointed Commissioner of the Court to make settlement with the Sheriff for the fiscal year ending February 1, 1912.

E. W. Coleman was relected road supervisor for the term of two years from April 10, 1912.

Accounts aggregating about \$90, including item of \$637.90 to J. J. A. E. Mullin, were allowed and ordered paid.

A number of matters of minor importance were disposed of.

TO PUT DOWN NIGHT RIDING.

Crittenden County Ky., Will Put
Patrolmen in Every
District.

Crittenden county authorities propose to prevent, if possible, a recurrence of night riding in that section. Following the burning of Arthur B. Jarvis' independent tobacco house and the receipt of threatening letters by R. M. Kemp, independent tobacco buyer, and I. C. Agent Venner, who was warned to furnish cars for none but pooled tobacco, a large mass meeting of farmers and business men was held Saturday afternoon at Marion. The meeting was called by County Judge John W. Blue and County Attorney John A. Moore. These officials stated that Messrs. Jarvis and Kemp proposed to buy tobacco, as usual, and that the I. C. would furnish them cars and had notified the county authorities that they expected protection in the pursuance of their legitimate business. Judge Blue and Attorney Moore said that further night riding methods would impose a heavy burden on the taxpayers, bringing the county into bad repute. County Judge Blue said he had divided the county into fifteen districts and had appointed a patrolman in each of these, who would be kept at the county's expense until a danger of night riding is over. He said he would not ask Gov. McCreary for aid. There was a big crowd at the courthouse and the statements of the officials were received with enthusiasm. Prominent members of the Farmers Union said the organization was opposed to lawlessness and would co-operate with the county in the effort to curb the night rider spirit.
