SOCIALISTS BADLY BEATEN

Milwaukee Sweeps Them From
Office With a Non-Partisan
Broom.

THE MAJORITY IS HUGE.

Far-Reaching Will Be the Ef-
fect on Every Municipality
of That State

Milwaukee, Wis., April 2.—With
a flood of non-partisan ballots, Mil-
waukee voters yesterday swept from
office the city's socialist administra-
tion, installed a non-partisan mayor,
board of aldermen and county board
of supervisors, and probably elimi-
nated every national political party
from participation in future munici-
pal elections in the state of Wis-
consin, because, as a result of the
non-partisan victory in Milwaukee
the legislature at a special session,
soon to be convened, is expected to
pass a distinctly non-partisan city
election statute.

Dr. G. A. Bading, non-partisan
candidate for mayor, today defeated
Mayor Seidel, socialist incumbent,
by a total vote of 43,177 to 30,200.
Of the thirty-three aldermen elected
twenty-six are non-partisan and seven
are socialists. Four socialist alder-
men hold over.

The widespread interest in the
fight to unseat the socialist adminis-
tration was indicated by the heavy
total vote of nearly 80,000. The
highest previous total vote cast in a
municipal election was 59,484 at the
time Mayor Seidel was elected two
years ago.

AGRICULTURAL TRAIN TO-DAY

Will Be at Peace Park for Two
Hours This Afternoon---A
Train of 8 Cars.

FARM SCHOOL ON WHEELS.

Latest Developments in All
Lines Will Be Shown and
Fully Explained.

It is a case of Mahomet and the
mountain. As all of the farmers,
livestock breeders, dairymen, pou-
ltry fanciers, gardeners, fruit grow-
ers and housekeepers of Kentucky
cannot attend the State's university,
or visit the United States Experi-
ment Station established in Lex-
ington for the benefit of Kentuck-
ians, the information which they
might thereby acquire is being taken
to their own doors.

There will arrive here to-day a lit-
eral combination of agricultural col-
leges and experiment stations on
wheels. This traveling farm school
consists of a railroad train of eight
cars, six of them rolling school-
houses, in which is every facility for
instruction, with expert teachers
of each department, and even equip-
ped with springy, fresh-covered
seats instead of the hard benches on
which most farmers learned the les-
sons of other school days.

These mobile schoolhouses will go
into the towns of nearly three-
fourths of Kentucky, pausing at
each place long enough to let the
people see the latest developments in
their respective lines of industry
and learn what improvements have
been accomplished, and new ideas
suggested by the progress of science,
and the special researches in which
hundreds of millions of dollars have
been spent by governments, state
and national, agricultural colleges
and individuals in solving secrets
which make life easier and more
profitable in all the departments of
country industry.

Prof. M. A. Scovell gave the fol-
lowing interesting outline of the
equipment of the train and what it
is hoped to accomplish by the tour:

"The work is extension work. The
object of the train is to bring before
the farmers directly the modern and
best methods of conducting the
farm. The matters that will be dis-
cussed and illustrated are:

"Soil fertility.
"How to produce crops most eco-
nomically.

"The production of animals on the
farm; types of animals; feeding of
animals.

"The best methods of dairying;
sanitation of the dairy.

"Poultry.
"Horticulture.

"Domestic science, including the
best methods of preserving food and
the cooking of food; sanitation of
food; house sanitation; landscape
gardening, etc.

"There is no better way to bring
the modern methods of agriculture
before the farmer than by illustra-
tion and the quickest way is by
means of the Agricultural Train,
where the farmer can get experts to
explain the various methods of mod-
ern agriculture and at the same time
illustrate, by means of charts or the


