

**J. W. BEWLY BREAKS JAIL**

**Calendar Swindler Saws Out of Todd's Bastile at Elkton.**

J. W. Bewly, the young man who was acquitted here a few weeks ago on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses by means of a calendar swindle, sawed out of jail at Elkton Thursday night. Bewly was taken to Elkton for trial on indictments there for similar frauds. He was tried here on only one indictment but there were four or five other charges that had not been investigated by the last grand jury. Russellville, Ky., Pleasureville, Ky., and several other towns were also wanting Bewly. He is a smooth young fellow and while in jail here his wife lived in this city and stuck to him through his troubles. She is still here.

**FAIRVIEW HAS ASSAULT CASE**

**Negro Attempts Outrage On Young Wife of George Robinson.**

**RUSHED TO ELKTON JAIL.**

**Great Excitement But Woman's Husband Opposes a Lynching Bee.**

A negro named Isham Taliaferro attempted an assault upon Mrs. George Robinson, a white woman, at Fairview, Wednesday. Mrs. Robinson was at home, two miles from Fairview, alone, when the negro appeared and asked where her husband was. She replied that Mr. Robinson was not at home. The negro then entered the house and seized her and threw her across a bed. To stifle her screams he smothered her with a quilt and choked her into unconsciousness. Just then one of the men on the place approached the house, and the negro hearing his footsteps, ran and made his escape. The alarm was given and searching parties scoured the country in every direction and Wednesday night Taliaferro was captured at his home, four miles from Fairview. When taken before Mrs. Robinson she positively identified him as her assailant. It is also said that later on the negro confessed.

The attempted assault had aroused intense feeling, and when it became known the negro was under arrest, gangs of men began to gather, and it was evident the mob spirit was rife.

Deputy Sheriff Penick and Robert Arnold started to Elkton with the negro, and, learning that they would probably meet a mob, they detoured through the country, and thus reached Elkton safely, and placed the negro in jail.

Feeling is still very high, and efforts may yet be made to lynch him. Mr. Robinson, husband of the woman, was with the party which arrested the negro, and he urged that the law be allowed to take its course. Mrs. Robinson is only eighteen years of age, and has a six weeks' old baby. Her husband is two years her senior. They are highly popular young people.

**TAX LEVY IS FIXED**

**By Fiscal Court at the Same Rate As Heretofore.**

**MUCH ROAD WORK PLANNED.**

**Adjourned Session Will be Held Next Wednesday, April 10.**

After a busy session for two days this week, the Fiscal Court adjourned until Wednesday of next week when road matters will be a special order.

The tax levy was fixed for 1912 at the old rate of 50 cents on the \$100 and a poll tax of \$1.50. The tax is apportioned 25 cents to roads and bridges, 10.7 cents for general fund, 4.5 cents for sinking fund for 1901 bonds, 3.1 cents for sinking fund for 1904 bonds, 6. cents for sinking fund for 1907 bonds, and 1.7 cents for sinking fund for 1910 bonds.

In addition, on request of Miss Jennie West, County Superintendent, a school levy of 20 cents on property and a poll tax of \$1.00 was made on all districts where there are no good schools.

The action previously taken abolishing the office of poor commissioner was reconsidered and Mr. W. F. Randle, poor commissioner, will remain in office until October 1.

The following road work was asked for:

Nine foot pike on Brewer's Mill road from end of the present pike to E. D. Jones' place.

Extension of Canton pike to Trigg county line.

One and a half miles of pike on Newstead to Pee Dee road.

Pike on Kirkmansville road from Todd county line toward Hopkinsville.

For sixteen foot pike on Crofton and Greenville road, running east out of Crofton.

For twelve foot pike on road leading from Clarksville pike to Bell's Station.

For one-half mile on Pilot Rock road.

For five and a half miles on Bradshaw road.
