## FATAL DOSE OF POISON

Is Taken By Miss Hazel Anderson Late Tuesday Night.

### DEATH SOON FOLLOWED ACT.

Attended Picture Show Just Before And Gave No Intimation of Her Intention.

Miss Hazel Anderson, aged 19, a daughter of Cal Anderson, who lives on West Eighteenth street, committed suicide Tuesday night about ten o'clock by taking carbolic acid. She lived only a short time. Drs. Jackson and Harned were hastily summoned but could not reach her in time to do any good. She died in great agony.

Miss Anderson had been an employe of the Kress store. Early in the evening, about eight o'clock, she went into J. O. Cook's drug store and asked for a three ounce bottle of carbolic acid. The clerk filled out the required blank in the poison register, taking down her name. She said the poison was to be used for disinfecting purposes. Later in the evening, evidently with the poison in her possession, she went to the Princess theatre and about nine o'clock left the picture show in company with Charles Beetem, a young man who works for the Kentucky Central Life and Accident Co. 27 East Ninth Street. Mr. Beetem went home with her and while he was still in the house Miss Anderson excused herself and going into an adjoining room drank about one-third of the contents of the bottle of carbolic acid bought two hours before.

The draught was necessarily fatal and death ensued in a short while.

No reason for the rash act has been made public.

Miss Anderson evidently arranged with coolness and deliberation to take her life and it could not have been due to any sudden resolve.

Funeral services were conducted at the residence yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock, by Rev. H. D. Smith

## BERT CANNON USED A PISTOL

In an Attempt to Destroy His Own Life Last Monday Night.

### TRAGEDY IN BAWDY HOUSE.

Wound Proved To Be Serious One But Will Not Result Fatally.

A young man named Bert Cannon, aged 20, shot himself in the shoulder, in a house of bad repute, on the Greenville road near the city, Monday night. He attempted to shoot himself in the heart but one of the inmates of the house saved his life for the time being by knocking up his hand holding the pistol. Cannon was crazed with jealousy over one of the women and writing a telephone number on a piece of paper asked some one to call it at once. Then getting up he went into another room. The woman followed him in time to see him with a pistol at his breast and jumping towards him knocked up his hand as the weapon was discharged. The wound, made by a 38-calibre S. & W. pistol, is a very serious one, but may not prove fatal.

Cannon completed a term of enlistment in the U. S. army not long ago and returned home.

## GOV. HARMON

Gov. Judson Harmon, chief executive of Ohio for the second term of four years, and one of the leading democratic candidates for the presidency of the United States, was a guest of Nashville and the Southern Congress Tuesday, and passed through Hopkinsville yesterday morning at 9 o'clock and made a brief stop. He was accompanied from Nashville to Hopkinsville by H. n. John F. Bible, who went to Nashville to hear him speak.

In this address at Nashville Gov. Harmon said:

"The advancement of the south is really extraordinary. We are beginning to take pointers from you. During the past year I visited the North and South Carolina exposition the corn show in Atlanta, and a number of sections of Texas. On these visits I had good glimpses of the great activity and progress of the south of today. Then last year when a boy from South Carolina carried off the prize at Washington, as the champion corn raiser of the United States, it made the whole country take notice.

"The last time I was in Nashville was in 1908. During the centennial exposition, in 1897, I spent a week here. Colonel Bryan was here at the same time. At that time I argued a case before the court of civil appeals."

A public reception was given in honor of Governor Harmon, Tuesday afternoon, from 4 until 6 o'clock, in the parlors of the Maxwell House.

At the general session of the Southern Commercial Congress Tuesday night, at the Ryman auditorium, Governor Harmon was one of the chief speakers. He took as his subject, "Agriculture—the Basis of the Nation's Strength."

Governor Harmon was en route to Omaha, Neb., where he will speak Friday night.

Upon the arrival of the train he alighted during the stopping of the train and mixed informally with a crowd of perhaps 100 people on the platform who had learned that he would be on the train. Gov. Harmon is a fine looking man in the sixties, with iron gray hair and moustache. He is tall and erect and has a pleasant, affable manner. A characteristic is that he makes friends wherever he goes. He is already the favorite candidate here on the Democratic side.
