Prof. Barksdale Hamlett has been suffering from eye trouble for several months and found it necessary to submit to a minor operation by a Louisville oculist this week. His many friends here hope that he may entirely recover from his trouble before long.

The Senatorial Race.

The claim of Senator R. M. Salmon to the nomination of the Democratic party for State Senator, upon the idea that it is the regular turn of Hopkins county, is based upon the fact that his brother, L. R. Salmon, was put forward in the absence of a candidate from Hopkins in 1891, to lead a forlorn hope and was defeated by a Republican, and to the further fact that a fusion was made with the Populist party in 1897 when Senator Crenshaw, who afterwards affiliated with the Democratic party, received the Democratic endorsement and was elected.

Here is a history of the races from the organization of the district:

1875—Senator C. N. Pendleton, Christian, beat Polk Laffoon for nomination.
1879—Dr. Prewitt, Hopkins.
1883—Senator Austin Peay, Christian.
1887—Zeno Young, Hopkins.
1891—L. R. Salmon, Christian, but moved to Hopkins.
1893—W. R. Howell, Christian.
1897—Senator Crenshaw, Christian (Populist.)
1901—Senator Edwards.
1905—Senator Rives.
1909—Senator Salmon.

Hopkins county waived its turn in 1891, never having presented a candidate who could win. No Democrat wanted the nomination the first year under the new constitution in 1893 and W. R. Howell was put forward, Hopkins refusing to present a man for the sacrifice. In 1897 with an unbroken record of 14 years of defeat, the Democrats made a fusion with the Populists and Senator Crenshaw redeemed the district, since which time the old order of alternating was resumed. Senator Crenshaw had become a Democrat and was entitled to an endorsement if any man ever was, but stepped aside and Senator Edwards was handed the honor on a silver platter. Senators Rives and Salmon then alternated in the regular order.

Since the district was redeemed 16 years ago, the only period that ought to be counted, Hopkins county has been given half of the terms and each time Christian county Democrats have overcome a Republican majority of 1200 to elect the nominee. This time, Christian's regular turn, with a hard fight on hand, the ticket needs a strong local man on it and Hopkins county should not cause trouble by claiming more than she is entitled to.
