Colored College Case.

Circuit Court has been for several days engaged in trying the equity case involving the validity of a contract of P. T. Frasier for running the M. & F. College, the colored school in this city. Argument was in progress yesterday.

Commission Government.

The city of Hopkinsville paid during 1913 the sum of \$27,015 to 35 officers of the city. Of this amount only \$1,365 was paid to the executive and legislative branches of the government. More than \$25,000 was paid to subordinate officers, many of whom worked under no orders or supervision. No business house in Hopkinsville would attempt to do a business with a pay roll of \$27,000 without a capable, supervising head for each department. No business house could run without selecting capable men with reference to fitness to perform duties and earn the salaries paid. Why should a great municipal corporation with \$5,000,000 of taxable property, be controlled by politicians? Should the spoils of office be used to further selfish ends by those answerable to no party? By adopting commission form to-day the people will make it possible to employ three trained business men as watchdogs of the city treasury to employ agents answerable to them and they will in turn be answerable to the people. Incompetent men can be removed without formality and capable public servants employed. The merit system alone will govern and nepotism, favoritism and bossism will be sent to the rear. Watch the schemers and you will find them conspiring with men of any party to throw dust in the eyes of the people. Politicians, above all things do not want business men to conduct municipal affairs. By their votes to-day the people will decide who is to rule Hopkinsville.

First "Game Law."

The first "game law" for the protection of wild animals and birds was enacted in 1068 by William the Conqueror. This decree of the Norman king was called a forest law, but its principal purpose was the preservation of game. Forfeiture of property was made a penalty for killing or disabling any kind of wild beast, while the slayer of a stag, buck or boar, if convicted, had his eyes put out. These laws, of course, applied only to the masses, since the royalty and nobility were permitted to kill as much as they pleased. In fact, the principal purpose of the pioneer "game law" was to provide sport for the few. The first parliamentary game law in England was passed in 1496. Game laws in America have become increasingly strict of late years, but they were adopted too late to save many species, notably the buffalo, from almost complete extinction.

Hero Medals.

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission has awarded more than 50 bronze and silver medals. In the latest list of these are six heroines: Margaret Guy, aged 16, of South Boston, Mass., who saved a lad three years her senior from drowning; Mary Allen, of Big Rapids, Mich., who rescued two girls from drowning in Rose Lake, Leroy, Mich.; Sophia Thomas, of Newry, S. C., who rescued a girl from a rabid dog; Phebe Briggs, a Vassar college girl, who saved three college mates from drowning; Mrs. Lillian M. Coburn, who saved two men from burning at Susanville, Cal., and Frances Spanke, a 14-year-old girl at Hartman, Ark., who lost her own life in saving another girl from being killed by a train. With these awards there is a list of close to a thousand "heroes of peace," who have been granted Carnegie medals since the fund was established ten years ago. In the list are Rev. Henry G. Gieger, Hickman, Ky., and William B. Charlton, Dover, Tenn., who saved a party of four from drowning in their home at Hickman, when the Mississippi river levee broke April 1, 1912.

Women's Wages.

Twenty-four per cent of girls and women employed in New Orleans department stores, laundries and factories get less than \$4 a week and fifty-six per cent less than \$6, according to the report of a special investigating committee of the National Consumer's League. Ten per cent are paid \$10 a week and less than one per cent as much as \$20.

Women Killed.

Two German aeroplanes on Wednesday dropped two bombs at Bethune, France, according to the correspondent of the Daily Mail in Northern France. The first failed to explode, but the second, which fell among market women, killed nineteen of them and injured forty others.

Two bombs were also dropped at Dunkirk on the same day from a Taube machine 9,000 feet up in the air. A woman and child were killed and all the windows in the neighborhood were smashed. The women of the town are terrified.
