Prominent Professional Man Born In The Metropolis of The State.

While a great many of Hopkinsville's leading business and professional men are country boys who have worked their way up from the farm, there are others who were born in large cities and who deliberately selected Hopkinsville as a more desirable city in which to establish homes.

In this class is Dr. R. L. Bradley, the pioneer veterinary surgeon of the city. He was born in Louisville, Ky., in 1870, and his professional education was obtained in the Ontario

Veterinary College, at Toronto, Ont., from which he graduated more than 20 years ago. In 1894 he came to Hopkinsville and opened an office for the practice of his profession and remained here several years and then removed to Cincinnati, where he practiced for a time. In 1904 he returned to Hopkinsville and located permanently.

Since that time he has built up a large business in his line. He conducts a veterinary hospital on West Eighth street and has a shoving forge in connection therewith. Dr. Bradley is recognized as thoroughly efficient in the profession he has followed for more than 21 years. Holding a degree from one of the leading American colleges, he is in the forefront and spares no pains to keep his hospital equipped in the most up-to-date manner and his methods are approved by science and successful experience.

Dr. Bradley has found time to give a portion of his attention to public matters, having served a term in the city Council and held membership in the Democratic organization of the county. He lives in a pretty home at 518 McPherson avenue.

Woman Senator.

Miss Kathryn Clarke, of Glendale, Ore., was chosen state senator at a special election in Oregon a few days ago and will have the honor of being the first woman to serve in that capacity in Oregon. Miss Clarke was appointed several weeks ago by Gov. West to fill a vacancy in the senate. The legality of the appointment was later questioned and a special election was held. Miss Clarke ran on the Democratic ticket against two men, and won with a plurality slightly under 100 votes. The other two women senators in the country are Mrs. Helen Ring Robinson, of Colorado and Mrs. Frances Willard Munds, of Arizona, both of whom have made excellent legislative records. Mrs. Munds presided over the Arizona senate recently very ably during a prolonged consideration of a bill to amend the law relating to the fees and salaries of county officers.

Gatlin Is Receiver.

Mayor D. W. Gatlin of Madisonville has received a telegram from the comptroller of the currency, appointing him receiver of the defunct Union National bank at Providence, which closed its doors a few days ago.

Little Girl Kills Herself.

Anner Siler, a little girl 14 years old, at Fayetteville, Tenn., committed suicide with her father's pistol. Grief over the treatment of her brother was the only known cause.

Big Coal Deal.

The Pittsburgh Coal Company sold to the Monongahela Consolidated Coal & Coke Company over 11,000 acres of coal lands for a price of over \$9,000,000.

Englands Resources.

Englands Chancellor of the exchequer, Lloyd-George says the countries fighting against Germany, Austria and Turkey, thus far have thrown only a third of their strength into the field. To maintain this force and to bring the remaining two-thirds into action will cost \$10,000,000,000, during the current year. It was declared amid cheering that Great Britain finally had decided to clamp on every ounce of sea pressure to choke off Germany's food supply in retaliation for the German submarine policy, and Mr. Lloyd-George drew additional cheering when he spoke of plans to countries expected to throw in their lot with the allies. He detailed financial arrangements the allies decided on at the Paris conference, and put into round figures what heretofore has been guessed—"How's that?" Was The Father of Twenty-four Children.

Rev. J. L. B. Darvall, aged 71 years, and for a number of years moderator of the Primitive Baptist Association of this section, died a few days ago at his home near Linton, Trigg county. He had been married twice, and was the father of twenty-four children. He was a Confederate veteran.

Historic Portrait.

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 17.—A history of the portrait of Washington, which has been reconstructed by Prof. Pasquale Farina, of Philadelphia, and will be unveiled by the Historical Society February 22, has been unearthed. It is a copy of Stewart's portrait and was made by Oliver Frazer, of Lexington, a famous artist of the last century. H. V. McChesney, who has been hunting through the records for facts concerning the portrait, said today he found an appropriation of \$550, made in 1834, for the purchase of the picture. It hung in the old Capitol and was presented to the Historical Society when the Capitol was moved.

Typhoid Vaccination.

In the armies of France, Germany, Austria and Russia vaccination against typhoid fever is compulsory and the results have vindicated the efficiency of the serum.

In the army of Great Britain, this form of vaccination has not been compulsory and there is a large society in Great Britain which is spending a vast amount of time and no inconsiderable sum of money urging the soldiers to refuse to be vaccinated.

The matter has been passed up to Lord Kitchener, who is himself a strong believer in vaccination against both typhoid and smallpox, and it is believed that vaccination among the soldiers already in the army will be made compulsory, but so extreme are the opponents of vaccination that it is feared that they may hold down recruiting if such an order is finally issued. In the meantime, Lord Kitchener has, through the officers at the front, established a set of rules that is denying the enlisted men to the vaccination points in thousands. No British soldier is given a day off from the trenches unless he has been vaccinated, and other persuasive methods, only a little short of direct compulsion, are settling the problem for men now under arms.

At the time of our war with Spain vaccination for typhoid fever was unknown and our soldiers died like flies at Chickasaw and elsewhere. When President Taft mobilized almost the entire regular army of the United States upon the Texas border in 1910 vaccination for typhoid was universal and compulsory, and it has been stated that there was not a death from typhoid among those troops.—Louisville Post.

Dr. Foote, Go Head.

Scoring hasty marriages as a menace to society, the Rev. Dr. U. G. Foote, of the Methodist Temple, in a sermon at Louisville, urged a united stand against the Jeffersonville marriage business and national legislation to curb the evil.

Killed By Live Wire.

Arthur Burton, 32 years of age, was found dead on top of the three story building of the St. Bernard Coal company, at Earlington, early Saturday morning, his death having been caused by coming in contact with a live wire on the building.
