### REVOLT AT CAMP OF MILITARY INSTITUTE.

Louisville, Ky., March 24.—A telegram to a Louisville man from his son, asking for funds to pay his way home, brought to light a revolt which had taken place at the winter camp of the Kentucky Military Institute.

Telegrams to Col. C. W. Fowler, head of the school, brought the reply that seventy of the boys had left the school, and demanded that the system of discipline be changed before they would return. Their demand was refused and the boys were given an opportunity to return. All but thirteen did so, and these have been expelled unconditionally.

One of the thirteen is the son of a prominent Louisville family, who only consented to tell of the facts he had learned, after a promise had been made that his name would not be used.

### ANOTHER EFFORT TO SAVE BECKER IS MADE.

Albany, N. Y., March 24.—Another effort to save the life of Charles Becker, under sentence of death for instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal, was made before the court of appeals today. Martin T. Manton, Becker's attorney, asked the court to reverse the judgment of conviction returned in the second trial, and to give Becker another chance to defend himself before a jury.

During the three-hour argument Mrs. Becker sat in the courtroom and made frequent notes.

Mr. Manton will conclude his argument tomorrow, and Assistant District Attorney Robert C. Taylor will argue against a new trial.

Manton attacked the testimony of Jas. Marshall, a negro witness at the second trial, who came into prominence recently through his conflicting affidavits concerning what he knew of the homicide.

### WIDOW OF STONE. WALL JACKSON.

The dispatches covering the death of the widow of General Stone Wall Jackson, the famous Confederate General, who died from the effects of wounds inflicted by his own men by mistake after the battle of Charleston. He is described by military historians as being the greatest military genius of a generation.

His widow, who was Mary Ann Morrison, daughter of Dr. Robert Morrison, a noted Presbyterian clergyman of North Carolina, has lived in retirement for so many years that the world had forgotten her existence. Only her intimates in the town where she lived knew that she had not passed into the Great Beyond. But she proved true to her dead soldier-lover, and now after a lapse of more than half a century she has crossed over the river and is resting under the shade of the trees in the green fields of Eden with one of the knightliest men that God ever created.—Bowling Green Messenger.
