KIDNEY AFFECTION

Caused Death of Mr. Thomas Wadlington.

Thomas F. Wadlington, a tenant on the Johnson farm near Striped bridge, died last Thursday. He had been a sufferer from kidney trouble for several years. Mr. Wadlington was about 63 years old. He formerly resided near Lafayette but moved to the Church Hill neighborhood the first of the year. He is survived by his wife and several children. The interment took place near Lafayette.

Mrs. Frank Macrae and children, and Mrs. H. L. McPherson were thrown out of a surrey Sunday in front of Judge Knight's, on South Main street. The horse became frightened at a pile of rocks near the T. C. crossing and ran into the city—a distance of probably half a mile. Finally it became tangled in the harness and fell and the sudden stop threw the occupants out. Only slight bruises were sustained. The vehicle had the shafts broken off.

After Social Clubs.

"SETTLE-UP WEEK" PROVES SUCCESS

Iowa Town Merchants Keep Money On Move Squaring Accounts.

A Chicago special to the New York World describes the workings of "settle-up week" in an Iowa town, where it proved a great success. The special says:

"Two small cities of the Middle West have had a 'settle-up day,' and merchants and customers say it's fine. The first 'settle-up day' was held at Waukon, Ia., in December. The Waukon merchants' organization entered on the plan after two weeks of thorough advertising in the newspapers and in bills distributed from house to house and farm to farm in the surrounding country. They then mailed statements to all their patrons, especially in arrears, calling their attention to the approach of 'settle-up week' and detailing the plans of the merchants.

"The merchants announced that they had notified all wholesalers and jobbers with whom they traded of their intention to use the money paid in to them by their patrons to pay bills against them in the hands of the wholesalers, as well as other bills outstanding in the Waukon community; and, in fact, about half of the money taken in by the merchants was paid out to factories and producers in and about Waukon.

"The week did not open very propitiously for the plan, but when two days had passed nearly 500 bills were counted paid. It was estimated that there were about 2,500 outstanding bills. By Wednesday of that week the paying up movement was under full headway, and the campaign was so pushed that merchants were enabled to remind the backward debtors with a minimum of offense.

"Have-you-paid-your-bill - to-day? signs were posted throughout the city, and the query was picked up and wide spread by the citizens and applied with as much freedom as the 'Have-you-registered-to-day?' query of pre-primary politics.


"The general run of the citizens responded without difficulty to the plan, but the slow-paying debtors had to be jarred repeatedly. The merchants mailed out a bill every day to each of their customers who owed accounts of longstanding. The bills were mailed out on bill heads of the merchants' organization. A bureau was established where protesting citizens could thrash out their differences with any merchant over any bill the amount, terms or existence of which they disputed. Few took advantage of this bureau, but such work as it did was effective.

"The report on the decisions of this bureau shows that in almost all the cases the books of the merchant were right, unless he had been grossly careless in keeping his books, which proved true in two or three cases. Forgetfulness was the cause of 90 per cent of the old unpaid accounts.

"When the balance of the week was cast up it was reported that more than 2,000 bills had been paid up to date, and that bank deposits of the merchants had been \$40,000 higher than ever before. The \$40,000 immediately was started on its way to the various creditors of the merchants, and it is estimated that \$25,000 of this found its way almost at once back into the hands of original payers.

"The 150 merchants in Oak Park, Ill., are now planning a 'settle-up week,' to be held about the third week in April. Three merchants of Oak Park had a 'settle-up week' on their own hook about a year ago, and they are behind the movement

for a general call on the citizens of the city. The Oak Park Commercial Association will vote on the plan March 10. There seems to be no objection to the project. The membership of 400 includes lawyers, bankers, doctors and real estate dealers, besides merchants. It is estimated that there is nearly \$100,000 outstanding on the books of merchants of the city."

ALMOST ON SIEGE BASIS.

Berlin.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Not only have Berlin cafes been required to close at 1, but late night suburban trains and electric "owl" cars are to be abolished. At one fell swoop, therefore, the Berliner has lost his famous night life, as well as the means of getting home should he tarry in town in search of some trace of it, for in addition to reduced train and bus service, the use of taxicabs has been ordered curtailed by two-thirds, so that tires, fuel and oil may be saved.

The recently announced order for all private cars to cease running has caused a flood of requests from individuals and firms asking for special permission to operate their cars, accompanied by detailed reasons why they should be given these permits. Under the order requests can be recognized only in case the motor cars are to be used exclusively in the empire, one of its states, or by an official; for protection against fire, for the transportation of the sick, or for rescue purposes or for the general public welfare—by physicians, veterinarians and the like.

Though permits may be issued for the automobile busses, Berlin anticipates that these soon will vanish from the streets. Already all but three lines have been abolished, the withdrawn vehicles being used for military purposes.

Preserving Cut Flowers.

Cut flowers may be preserved by keeping them in a moist atmosphere. Another method is to dip them carefully as soon as gathered in perfectly limpid gum water, and after allowing them to drain for two or three minutes to set them upright. The gum forms a transparent coating on the surface of the petals and stems and preserves the color and figures of the flowers long after they have become dry and crisp.
