

### HIGH PRICES FOR DUROCS

John H. Williams Puts on Market More Than \$3,200 Worth of Hogs.

One of the finest lots of hogs ever sold from the Ashbrook herd was sold in a public sale at the Pennyroyal Fair ground, Friday, by John H. Williams, of Pembroke, who owns the herd. A total of fifty-six head of Duroc sows, gilts and boars were sold. A large number of hog fanciers were here and a number of people from the city drove out to the sale, making a good crowd. The sales aggregated \$3,207, which is an average of \$57.27 per head. The highest price was paid by E. E. Walters, of Carlisle, Ill., who paid \$150 for a sow bred to Imperator.

### BURNED TO DEATH

Mrs. John J. Pershing and Her Daughters Victims of Fire at San Francisco.

San Francisco, Aug. 27—Mrs. John J. Pershing, wife of Brigadier-General John J. Pershing, was burned to death with three of her four children at her quarters in the Presidio, San Francisco, early today. The children burned are Helen, 8, and Anne, 6, and Mary Margaret, 6.

Warren Pershing, 5 years old, survives. Explosion of a night lamp is believed to have caused the tragedy. Mrs. Pershing was a daughter of Senator Warren of Wyoming.

Her husband was at El Paso in command of troops.

### Turkey's Population.

Constantinople has about 1,000,000 inhabitants. But of these a large proportion are Greeks, Armenians and Jews—non-Mohammedans. Asia Minor, the important part of Turkey, has only 11,000,000 people. Armenia and Kurdistan have a population of about 2,500,000. The Armenians are mistrusted, and have been so long raided by the Kurds that they have little loyalty to the government. The Kurds, while destructive as raiders of the Armenians and intensely cruel, are valuable chiefly as irregular soldiers, and are not good material for a modern army. Arabia, though a large country, has only 1,000,000 inhabitants, who live in deserts. They are impatient of any restraint, and probably add little to Turkey's military strength, unless to repel an invasion of their territory.—Exchange.

For the first time in its history the United States leads the world as an exporter. Occasionally we have surpassed the United Kingdom in the exportation of domestic products, but it was only in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1915, that our total exports, domestic and foreign, exceeded those of the United Kingdom. Our total exports in the fiscal year 1915, according to an official statement of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce, aggregated \$2,768,600,000, as against \$2,170,100,000 for the United Kingdom.

### NOTED FOR LONGVITY

Last Brother Dies in Powhatan County, Virginia, Aged Ninety-four.

Judge W. P. Winfree, of this city, has just received a letter informing him of the death of his uncle, Wm. A. Winfree, of Powhatan county, Va. He died ten days before his 94th birthday and was the last of four brothers, whose joint ages at the time of their deaths was 364 years, or an average of 91 years. One died in Virginia last year, one in Georgia 3 years ago and one, the father of the Winfree in Christian county, several years ago. One sister survives in Hopkins county, Ky., aged 88 years. The brother, S. T. Winfree, of this county, reared 14 children here, all of whom he and his wife lived to see grown and married. His living descendants, including those by marriage, number 106, more than half of whom live in California. Judge W. P. Winfree, aged 72, is the oldest representative of his father's family.
