SCHEME OF MRS. HARRIMAN

To Find Out What's The Matter With Human Race.

NOTABLE MEN TO ASSIST

Project of Purifying By Eugenic Methods on Big Scale.

New York, September 13.—Mrs. E. H. Harriman's gigantic enterprise at Cold Springs Harbor, L. I., to ascertain "what is the matter with the human race" has launched a campaign for the sterilization of 15,000,000 Americans.

Coincident with this amazing statement comes the exclusive announcement through The Enquirer of the plans of the Eugenic Society which will have at its disposal the vast fortune of Mrs. Harriman, liberal financial assistance from John D. Rockefeller and Andrew Carnegie and scientific aid from Alexander Graham Bell, and the greatest host of scientists ever joined in a great undertaking.

For four years preliminary work has been quietly conducted not only at Cold Springs Harbor, but by field workers all over the world. With the completion and opening of the new record office at Cold Springs Harbor to-day the first insight into the work already accomplished and what is expected to be done was given.

The board will have the direction of the following famous men: Alexander Graham Bell, inventor of the telephone, scientist and philanthropist, Chairman; Dr. William H. Welch, pathologist of John Hopkins University, Baltimore, Vice Chairman; Dr. L. F. Barker, of John Hopkins, and President of the National Commission for Mental Hygiene; Dr. T. H. Morgan, of New

Pork, zoologist; Irving Fisher, professor of political economy at Yale, and Dr. E. E. Southard, of Boston, famous pathologist.

The Secretary of the board and Resident Director is Dr. Charles B. Davenport, New York biologist. H. H. Laughlin is Superintendent and Prof. Howard J. Banker, a noted botanist of DePaul University, has been installed as scientific expert.

Dr. Davenport in discussing this part of the work said:

"Perhaps the most gigantic efforts of the institution are directed toward nationwide sterilization laws. The whole task of eugenics does not, however, lie with segregation and sterilization. These two agencies represent at best only the negative side of improving human stock.

"As with the improvement of any other species, the human species must be improved by encouraging fit matings among the better classes and cutting off the lower levels.

OPENING DAY FOR BETHEL

Girls From Many States Are Gathering For The Fall Session.

THE BUILDING IS CROWDED

General Rearrangement To Make More Room—President Moves To Another Building.

All was bustle and confusion at Bethel Female College yesterday. Workmen were busy finishing up the many improvements being made, putting in the window screens, hanging curtains, papering rooms and whitewashing things on the outside.

Under the energetic direction of Mrs. Mary Bassett, the matron, much has been done. One innovation is a rest room in the large hall in the basement. The walls have been whitened and the Alumnae will be asked to equip it with chairs, tables and sofas for the girls.

The dining room has been newly papered and so have many of the other rooms. The library in the annex has been cut into class rooms and the class rooms above it have been turned into bed rooms. The removal of President Peterson's family and some of the teachers to the Bailey Waller residence opposite the college grounds has made available three or four more rooms for girls. One of these, the big gym room, has been turned into one of the best bed-rooms in the building and it will be occupied by four new girls from Trenton.

President Peterson is expecting not less than 60 and perhaps 70 boarding pupils, which will be the largest opening in the history of the college. The girls will be arriving on every train today and tonight and the formal opening will be tomorrow morning. The new dormitory is an imperative need.

Gypsum.

The Geological Survey is now distributing its annual report on the production of gypsum in 1914. Crude gypsum was mined in the United States to the extent of 2,476,465 short tons during the year, with a value of \$6,895,989.

TERRE HAUTE WAS NO WORSE

Prosecutor Rucker Declares Election Corruption in Indianapolis Was the Limit.

ONLY 3 DEMOCRATS JURORS

Mayor Joseph E. Bell Declared to Be the Head of the Whole Conspiracy.

Indianapolis, Sept. 13.—Mayor Joseph E. Bell, as the head of the police department, was held responsible for the majority of the alleged election law violations, on Nov. 3, 1914, by Prosecutor Alvah J. Rucker, who began his opening statement in the trial of the mayor, who is under indictment for election conspiracy. The jury in the case was sworn Friday.

The mayor watched the prosecutor closely practically all the time he was speaking and frequently whispered to his attorneys. Thomas Taggart, who is also under indictment with the mayor, was absent from the court most of the day.

Prosecutor Rucker asserted that the evidence in the case would show that the election frauds in Terre Haute, in which a number of men, including Mayor Donn M. Roberts, were sentenced to federal prison, were no worse than those in Indianapolis.

"There is no office in the state," asserted the prosecutor, "that is more powerful than that of the mayor of Indianapolis. With his control of the police, the saloons and the resorts he can swing an election to suit himself. Men were slugged by the police and kept from voting. Mayor Bell saw this at one precinct, and not only did he not lift his voice to stop it, but aided and abetted it."

McCracken Boy's Crop.

Paducah, Ky., Sept. 13.—A field of corn, which is acknowledged to be the best in quality, if not in quantity, of any in the county, has been raised by Pratt Allison, of McCracken county, one of the members of the Boys' Corn Club. The average of the ears is about twelve inches in length, with as many as twenty-six rows of kernels. The corn has shown no sign of rot at the tassel end and is considered by experts to be a perfect specimen. It will be entered at both the county fair here and at the State Fair at Louisville.

Mayfield, Ky., Sept. 11.—A sensational suit for \$10,000 damages for the alienation of his wife's affections has been filed in the Graves circuit court by Dan Childers against R. L. Cash, both of Fancy Farm. The petition states that the plaintiff's wife had abandoned her home and is now in Louisville, Ky.
