Crowd of Pathfinders Encounter Heavy Roads.

Russellville, Ala., Oct. 15.—Jackson highway pathfinders reached Florence late Wednesday night after a hard day's drive in rain and mud. Enthusiastic meetings marked the day's journey, and from two to half a dozen cars conveyed the pathfinders from one county to the next. Meetings held at Columbia, Spring Hill and Mt. Pleasant, Tenn., urged the commission to recommend the Jackson military road for the highway. A large audience packed the courtroom at Lawrenceburg, in spite of the rain. Sheffield and Tusculum, Ala., sent the pathfinders away under cloudy skies, which developed into rain. Muddy, heavy roads compelled a revision of the schedule and the party laid over at Russellville for the night. Columbus, Miss., or Macon, Miss., will be the night goal for Friday.

How to Live Long.

The United States Public Health Service and the various health agencies of this country are working to prolong the average duration of life. In this they are obeying the desire for existence which is the strongest instinct of mankind. Only a small proportion of the human race rounds out its tour of duty on this earth. Some people are born with good bodies which they treat well. Barring accidents, they live a long time. Some people are born with poor bodies which they treat well. Barring accidents they can live to a ripe old age. Some people are born with good bodies which they treat badly and some people are born with poor bodies which they treat badly. They don't last long.

It is recorded that in Yorkshire in 1501, Henry Jenkins was born. He died in 1670, cut off at the age of 169. He remembered well the battle of Flodden Field. This occurred in 1513, when he was 12 years of age. The Register of Chancery and other courts show the administration of oaths to him 140 years prior to his death. He gave deposition as witness when he was 157. In his young manhood, when he was a little over 100, he was a remarkable swimmer. The term "old age" too frequently is another term for the falling due of the debts of youth. Over-eating, over-drinking, over-playing, over-working, these are drafts on the bank of nature which sooner or later must be met. Sometimes the day of reckoning can be put off a little bit, but Dame nature will not be wheedled out of her claim.

The remarkable thing about Henry Jenkins is the fact he has left behind him no rules of living which would enable one to duplicate his feat. In this he showed great self-repression. As a matter of fact there is no royal road to old age and it is not to be obtained by a particular dietary or regimen of life. Perhaps the best rule may be expressed in one word, "Moderation." Moderation in food, moderation in drink, moderation in the joys and worries of life, moderation in work, moderation in recreation, equanimity of the mind, the soul and the body. These make for long tenure of life.

WORK BEGUN

On The First State Aid Highway in County.

The work of building the six miles of approved turnpike on the Princeton road, under the state aid law, has been begun and will be rushed through as rapidly as possible. C. D. McQuarry is the contractor and the cost is a little over \$4,000 per mile. The pike begins at the Caldwell county line and comes toward Hopkinsville. It must be completed by June 30, 1916, and then the contract will be let for the remaining ten miles on that road reaching into Hopkinsville.

The work is being done according to plans and specifications which have been approved by the state road department. C. A. Ligon, a state road engineer, has arrived here, and is in immediate charge of the work. John A. Whittaker, government engineer assigned to this district, is also keeping in close touch with it, as is County Engineer J. H. Dillman.

Auto Kills Squirrel.

The Danville-Junction City automobile ran over a squirrel in front of the Metcalfe farm yesterday afternoon and killed it. This is said to be an unusual thing, as squirrels, as a rule, are too fleet to be overtaken in this manner.—Danville Advocate.

Giant Sunflowers.

OPPORTUNITY FOR YOUNG MEDICAL MEN

Government Filling Vacancies In Public Health Service.

Young medical men between the ages of 23 and 32 will be given an opportunity on November 1, 1915, according to a circular just issued by Surgeon General Rupert Blue, to demonstrate their fitness for admission to the grade of Assistant Surgeon in the U. S. Public Health Service.

There are several vacancies in the government's mobile sanitary corps, which is now in the 118th year of its existence, but in order to be recommended to the President for a commission, a physical and professional examination must first be passed. As the tenure of office is permanent and the Public Health officers are liable to duty in all parts of the world, they are required to certify that they believe themselves free from any ailment which would disqualify them for service in any climate. Boards will be convened at Washington, Boston, New York, Chicago, St. Louis, Louisville, New Orleans and San Francisco, but permission to take the examination must first be obtained from the Surgeon General. The examination is searching and includes, in addition to the various branches of medicine, surgery and hygiene, the subjects of the preliminary education, history, literature and the sciences.

Commissions will be issued as Assistant Surgeon and, after four years of service, the young officers are entitled to examination for promotion to the grade of Passed Assistant Surgeon, and after twelve years of service to another examination for promotion to the grade of Surgeon. The annual salaries are: Assistant Surgeon, \$2,000; Passed Assistant Surgeon, \$2,400; Surgeon, \$3,000; Senior Surgeon, \$3,500; Assistant Surgeon General, \$4,000. When the Government does not provide quarters, commutation at the rate of \$30, \$40, and \$50 a month according to grade is allowed. All grades receive longevity pay, that is, 10 per cent in addition to the regular salary for every five years until the maximum of 40 per cent is reached. When officers travel on official duties they are reimbursed their actual expenses.

Railroad Wins.

A \$5,000 verdict awarded J. O. Stokes' administratrix against the Louisville & Nashville in the Hopkins Circuit Court was reversed by the Court of Appeals in an opinion by Commissioner Clay. Stokes was killed by falling and striking the back of his head when he stepped off a moving train at Madisonville. The Court of Appeals said the verdict should have been directed for the railroad.

Jockey Killed.

Jockey Carl Ganz, the Louisville rider who was injured at Latonia last Monday in a spill during the running of a race, died last night without ever regaining consciousness.

DEMOCRATIC CANDIDATES TO REPORT

Will Send Back to Headquarters Information They Gather on Tour of State.

Just to be on the safe side and in order that may "keep tabs" on conditions everywhere in the state, the Democratic campaign managers have assigned certain definite territory to the various candidates on the state ticket, each man to be responsible for the situation in the territory assigned to him. It was decided, at the meeting of the candidates at the Galt House on the night of Monday, Sept. 27th., that as the candidates traveled over the state, they would send in their reports to headquarters and that they would hold regular meetings in Louisville during the campaign, to discuss each others reports. The managers feel that this plan will enable them to keep in absolute close touch with the progress of the campaign.

Under the arrangement arrived at, Judge James D. Black, candidate for lieutenant governor, and Col. Robert L. Greene, candidate for auditor of public accounts, will look after the Eleventh Congressional district; Hon. Sherman Goodpaster, candidate for state treasury, and Judge Ernest B. Clarke, candidate for Judge of the Court of Appeals in the Seventh Appellate division, will look after the Ninth; Professor Barksdale Hamlett, candidate for secretary of state, will look after the First; Hon. Matt S. Cohen, candidate for commissioner of agriculture, the Fourth; A. O. Stanley, the Second; Hon. Rodman W. Keenon, candidate for clerk of Court of Appeals, the Eighth, and Hon. V. O. Gilbert, candidate for superintendent of public instruction, and Hon. M. M. Logan, candidate for attorney general, the Third. The Fifth and Sixth districts, being city districts, will be looked after by the regular city organizations.

The Balkans.
