

MAYOR OF PADUCAH

Ernest Lackey Is Elected After Hot Fight.

Paducah, Ky., Nov. 5.—Ernest Lackey, former alderman was elected mayor in the election here which was the hottest in the past ten years, the fight was between the "citizens" ticket, headed by Frank Burns and the "Hazelip" ticket, controlled by Mayor Thomas Hazelip, Commissioner Burns defeated candidate in the mayor's race was 252 votes behind. For commissioner Thomas Hazelip, Charles Vanmeter, George Wallace and Lawrence Washington were elected. Washington was the only member of the citizens ticket to be elected. George Wallace lead the ticket with 2,648 votes. The election was a hard fought one, very bitter but no violence occurred.

The Pigmy of Books.

United States Marshal Chesterfield C. Middlebrooks, administrator of the estate of Edward Clarke, found in the office of the latter a dictionary measuring one inch, three fourths of an inch wide, and one-fourth of an inch thick, and it contains 384 pages. School Problems The Subject of Paper Discussion.

The regular monthly meeting of the Athenaeum was held Thursday night at Hotel Latham with only one paper "Some Phases of Rural Life" by Prof. L. E. Foster. His paper, a comprehensive one with an interesting historical background, drifted into a treatment of the school system, of which he is the head in Christian county, and an advocacy of consolidated rural schools. His views met with approval and a general discussion of schools followed, several members denouncing the tendency to shorten the school day and lessen the work done as the term is lengthened and salaries increased.

WOMEN ELECTED

On Nicholasville School Board, Though They Were Thought Defeated.

Nicholasville, Ky., Nov 5.—The women who were candidates for the Board of Education were supposed to have been defeated by fifty votes, but an examination of the books Thursday found that they were not legally kept in all the precincts, except Precinct No. 1. In the other precincts the clerks had merely drawn a line under the name of the candidate, the name of the voter being omitted entirely. After several of the lawyers here had passed opinions, Maury Kemper was called from Lexington by Mrs. Harry McCarty and after the examination of the books, declared the women elected. The women are Mrs. Harry McCarty, Mrs. W. J. Wolf, Mrs. Frank Folger and Mrs. C. A. Kenney. Precinct No. 1, gave the women a majority of seventy-two.

CLOSE CLIP IN CADIZ.

In the election here Tuesday for Councilmen, Charley Cunningham was elected as a member of the new council by one vote over Capt. F. G. Terry, who has been a member of the council for several years. All five of the other old members were elected as follows: John R. Vinson, W. B. Woodruff, G. P. Thomas, Van B. Alexander and John E. Edwards. There were two tickets, the six members of the old council being on one, and C. B. Cunningham and W. D. Mitchell being the only two names on the other.—Record.

BYRNS URGES TOBACCO SHIPMENTS TO GERMANY

Effort to Relieve Situation Which Greatly Affects Farmers of Tennessee.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—Congressman Joseph W. Byrns, the able and popular representative from the Hermitage district, is in Washington. Mr. Byrns is at his customary stopping place, the Burlington. He came to the capital at this time to take up with Secretary of State Robert Lansing the important question of getting tobacco to European countries. Mr. Byrns has the matter up in all its phases with the department and hopes to be able to do something to relieve the condition in which the people of his district find themselves by reason of the war and the war measures curtailing neutral commerce which have been adopted.

Mr. Byrns takes the position that tobacco is absolutely noncontraband and should be allowed free movement at all times.

Secretary of State Lansing has given much time to the study of Tennessee and the tobacco situation and he is co-operating with Mr. Byrns in every possible way.
