FARM STOCK

KEEP HORSES IN GOOD ORDER

Stim Economy to Permit Animals to
Fall Off in Flesh—Oats and
Corn Are Best Grains.

It is poor economy to let the horses
fall off in flesh by reducing the grain.
Horses cannot be kept in good order
on straw and a poor quality of hay.
They need a little grain, even if they
are idle. To have the horses strong
for spring plowing, harrowing and
other heavy and exhaustive work,
they must be kept thrifty and in good
flesh all through the winter. Oats
and corn and bran are the best grains.
If there is no steady work, take off

the shoes and give them daily ex-
ercise in the yard every suitable day.
A grass pasture adjoining the sta-
bles is a great convenience. The
stock may be turned in when the soil
is dry and the weather suitable; they
will get the exercise they need and
will keep warm by grazing. Most
stockmen provide winter as well as
summer pasture for their stock.

The driving horses, if used on icy
roads, should have shoes sharpened.
It is dangerous to drive a smooth
horse when the road is icy. The wear
and tear of the nervous strain takes
too much out of a horse, if nothing
more serious happens.

Chain overshoes can be had at the
agricultural stores. Keep a pair on
hand to use in case of a sudden
freeze.

Give the horses judicious feed, daily
exercise and good grooming. When
this is done the horse's usefulness
may be extended for a number of
years.

TREATING SHEEP FOR WORMS

Pests May Be Combated by Pasture
Rotation, Combined With Drugs
Injurious to Insects.

The stomach worm is the worst
pest affecting sheep. Lambs are more
susceptible than older sheep, prob-
ably because the older sheep are ac-
customed to the presence of the worm.
In the spring, soon after lambing, the
old sheep should each receive a dose
of one or two ounces of gasoline, fol-
lowed by a small dose of epsom salts.
After a day or two they should be
placed in a worm-free pasture, if pos-
sible.

In July treat the whole herd, includ-
ing the lambs, with gasoline, and turn
them into new pasture, and repeat the
process in November. Pasture rota-
tion, combined with drugs that are in-
jurious to the worm, is a practical
method of successfully combating this
worm.

ERADICATE LICE ON CATTLE

Frequently Serious Pest on Stock in
Winter—Any of Various Dips
Are Quite Effective.

Lice on cattle and young stock are
frequently a serious pest in winter.
Any of the various dips advertised or
sold for this purpose are effective.
They can be put on with a sponge or
brush and worked in thoroughly to
the skin, but it is not always safe to
wet an animal all over in cold weath-
er.

Kerosene and lard rubbed in from
horns to the tail is a safe and sure
remedy. An even better one is to use
powdered sulphur. Rub it in well with
the hand and repeat in two weeks.
There is no danger from using this.

Fill Up Mud Holes.

GOOD ROADS

GOOD ROADS ASSIST CITIES

Merchants in Town Reap as Much
Profit as Persons Living Along
Improved Highways.

"Men who have been successful in
building up large enterprises, men
who have made a lifelong study of
conditions of affairs where bad roads pre-
dominate, and men who have put their
best efforts into improving highways
are unanimous in one opinion—that it
is the duty of big cities to help in
building good roads that lead into
their limits," said a good roads en-
thusiast to a Washington Star repre-
sentative.

"The cities derive as much benefit
as, if not more than, the residents
along the route of the proposed im-
provement.

"It has been proved time and time
again that farm lands with a hard

road outlet into the city are far more
valuable than the farm that is shut off
from the city five months out of the
year on account of impassable roads.

"The farmer benefits by easier haul-
ing, cheaper transportation, time sav-
ing and better social conditions for
his wife, children and self.

"The city benefits by cheaper prod-
uce, the opportunity for the rural resi-
dent to get into the city and make
purchases and the merchant in town
can extend his zone of delivery far out
into the country.

"The best proof that good roads
bring prosperity is brought home to
the very doors of Washington by a
comparison of the two states on the
borders of the District of Columbia.

"Maryland has practically finished a
six-year job of good roads building.
Virginia has hardly commenced. A
two-hour automobile ride, say to Fred-
erick, Md., followed by a two-hour ride
through Virginia to Warrenton, will
show a contrast that is not hard to
understand.

"Washington has profited greatly by
the good roads to Frederick. It has
brought thousands of dollars to this
city.

"Within the past year a good road
has been built to Fairfax, Va., which
is half way to Warrenton. Conditions
for the better are noticeable along this
stretch. Twenty-three more miles are
needed to put Warrenton in close
touch with the capital. A greater part
of the amount necessary has been
raised in the country district, the bal-
ance is looked for in Washington. Just
how far the business and motorists in
Washington will go along this line is
problematical, but that Washington
will profit by a good road to Warren-
ton or any other Virginia town within
a radius of fifty to one hundred miles
is a certainty. Making the path to
one's door easy for the purchaser is
always good advertising. Helping
build a good road into the city that
will bring thousands of buyers into
town is surely making the path eas-
ier."

ASPHALT OIL BEST ON ROADS

University of Missouri Engineering
Dean Says Tests Show It is Su-
perior to Anything Else.

The only kind of oil used in oiling
streets or roads. In the opinion of
Dean E. J. McCausland of the school
of engineering of the University of
Missouri, should be an oil that con-
tains asphalt. Oil that contains paraf-
fin will evaporate rapidly and leave
a road muddy and sticky.

The engineering experiment station
here has analyzed many samples of
road oils sent to the university from
various parts of the state. Oil that
has an asphalt base will give almost
as much satisfaction as asphalt pave-
ment, is the opinion of Dean McCaus-
land.
