

### REVIVAL HAS CLOSED

Total of Twenty-six Additions To the First Baptist Church.

The Jenkins revival closed at the First Baptist Church Sunday night and Dr. M. A. Jenkins' final sermon was from Proverbs 19:12, "He that pursueth evil, pursueth it to his own death." A great crowd was present, filling every nook and corner in the church.

Co. D. under the command of Capt. Henry J. Stites, attended in a body, and at the close of the sermon when a request was made that all christians stand up, nearly all the soldier boys arose. On a further call two went forward, one to be reinstated in the church and another to indicate his intention to join another church.

Both Dr. Jenkins and the pastor, Dr. Thompson, referred to the presence of the soldiers and Rev. H. E. Gabby made a special prayer that they might be watched over and given divine protection in the impending crisis.

One person united with the church, making 26 in all, one by letter and 25 for baptism. Dr. Thompson paid a high tribute to Dr. Jenkins at the close.

Mr. and Mrs. Butler left on Friday and at the closing services the musical director was Mr. Pettus White, who performed a difficult duty with much success. He was assisted by other local musicians in solos and quartettes at each service, of which there were four held Sunday.

### JUDGE REED'S FAST WORK

Tries Four Commonwealth Cases In One Forenoon.

### GRAND JURY HAS QUIT

Case Against City of Hopkinsville Was On Trial Yesterday.

The grand jury was finally excused Saturday when it turned in 27 more indictments, making 45 in all.

Most of the later ones were for minor offenses and parties are not all in custody.

One of the indictments was against Annie Pearl and Sam Gilchrist for housebreaking. They are charged with breaking into the store of Lannes Huggins at Casky and stealing \$6 in money and a lot of goods Friday night. They were nabbed here Saturday by policeman J. R. Wolfe and most of the goods recovered, and in a few hours were indicted. The woman was wearing men's overalls, trousers, jacket and cap when arrested.

Yesterday three commonwealth's cases were tried with Judge W. M. Reed on the bench.

Jim Diuguid, grand larceny, was given 2 years.

Elder Waters, forgery, drew 2 years.

Sam Skinner, malicious cutting, got off with \$50 and costs.

Bessie Brumley Powell, charged with maintaining a common nuisance, was fined \$25 and costs.

Yesterday afternoon the damage case of Herbert McMath vs. City of Hopkinsville was begun. The plaintiff, a little boy, fell in a manhole in the sidewalk at Main and 17th streets, while workmen were putting in a drainpipe and sustained injuries that were made the grounds for the suit. The case was in progress when court adjourned.

### Wine of Cardui Wins.

Chicago, June 24.—The American Medical association was found guilty of libeling the Chattanooga Medicine company, manufacturers of Wine of Cardui, by a jury here. Damages were fixed at 1 cent. The jury had been out six days. The medicine company suit was for \$100,000 damages.

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### PLANS FOR BETHEL COLLEGE

New Contract to be Entered Into to Meet Changed Conditions.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bethel Woman's College held Saturday a new contract was authorized to be entered into with Prof. W. S. Peterson, and other important matters were decided upon.

The college, the name of which was recently changed, is to be a standard Junior College and a fund has been provided for putting the main building into first-class shape at once. Painters, carpenters and other workmen will thoroughly overhaul the building during vacation.

Prof. Peterson's family will not occupy the dormitory after school commences. The subscriptions made to the dormitory fund several years ago will be used as the basis of a new movement for further improvements and the college will be put upon a more substantial basis than for several years.

The attendance last year was the largest in the number of boarding pupils for 20 years and Prof. Peterson says his prospects are most encouraging for the coming session.

### Close But Enough.

The official majority for good roads in Trigg was only 82 in a total vote of 2,174. Messrs. W. C. White, D. A. Mitchell, Frank Walthall, E. Peal, W. C. Broadbent, Geo. C. Dawson and Hilson Peal, seven of the commissioners to handle the proposition of building the roads under the bond issue, met in Cadiz last Monday and perfected an organization, with Mr. White chairman. The other member of the commission, DeWitt Joiner, of Roaring Spring, was not present, he having failed to get his notice of the meeting.

### REFUSE TO RETURN TO WORK

District No. 23. United Mine Workers, Vote Against Proposal to Arbitrate.

Central City, Ky., June 23.—With only six unions unreported indications tonight are that the United Mine Workers in district No. 23 have voted down a proposition to return to work and arbitrate their differences with the West Kentucky coal operators association. The unions heard from showed that the miners voted almost solidly against the proposition, claiming that it meant less wages for them.

National and district officials recommended that the proposition be ratified. About 6,000 men are involved.

### WAS VETERAN BOOK-KEEPER

Death of Mr. W. E. Anglin, Long With T. M. Jones.

Mr. W. E. Anglin died yesterday morning at an early hour at the Jennie Stuart Memorial Hospital, where he was taken for treatment two weeks ago. Death was due to Bright's Disease, other complications being contributory. He was 66 year old and a son of the late Col. William Anglin, of Lafayette. Mr. Anglin had been in the employ of Mr. T. M. Jones for 25 years as book-keeper. He was very quiet and unassuming in manner and no man stood higher in the community in which he had resided during the past quarter of a century. He had been a member of the Methodist church for a number of years. Two brothers, Charles Anglin, of Clarksville, and Sam Anglin, of Purchase, and one sister, Miss Jennie Anglin, of Clarksville, survive. The remains were taken to Clarksville yesterday afternoon and the interment will take place in Greenwood cemetery this morning at 11 o'clock.
