That whereas, on the 25th day of July, 1916, death claimed one of our beloved comrades, William H. Jesup, and we, surviving comrades, being desirous of showing our love and respect for his memory, submit the following resolutions:

- Resolved:
1. That in the death of William H. Jesup, the community has lost a valuable citizen and man of the highest integrity and sense of honor, and a gentleman without fear or reproach, and that our Camp has lost a lovable and gallant comrade, who was a brave and patriotic soldier of the "Lost Cause."
  2. That we, the comrades of the deceased, take this method of expressing our deep sorrow at his death and the high esteem in which he was held by us on account of his fidelity and devotion and gallantry as a soldier and officer in the service of his country, as well as on account of his high sense of honor, and his lovable traits of character.
  3. Be it recorded that our comrade, William H. Jesup, was born in Todd county, Kentucky, April 26th 1843, and enlisted on October 8, 1861, in Company H, 1st Ky. Cavalry, as a private, and that most of his life was spent in Christian county, where he was actively engaged until a few years since in business.
  4. That this resolution be spread upon the minute book of this camp and a copy sent to the family of our deceased comrade.
