SHARP REACTION IN FOOD PRICES

Potatoes Drop to Six Cents a Pound in Gotham—City Selling Foodstuffs.

New York, Mar. 2.—Twenty thousand pounds of Pacific coast smelt from Seattle arrived here yesterday and was placed on sale at more than forty stores throughout the city at six cents a pound to relieve the high price of food, it was announced by George W. Perkins, chairman of the mayor's food committee.

The food committee also has on hand Mr. Perkins said, 500,000 pounds of Brazilian brown beans which will be offered to the public at small cost Monday, while a great quantity of rice is also being held in reserve to be thrown on the market should there be any attempt by dealers to hold back supplies and drive the price up. Hominy is another commodity the

committee is holding in large amounts to be used in relieving a high market if necessary.

POTATOES TAKE DROP.

There was a reaction in the food situation Thursday and dealers who a few days ago bought potatoes and onions and offered them at high prices, were willing to sell at a loss to themselves, it was announced by Joseph Hartigan, commissioner of weights and measures. The onion market, the commissioner said, "is completely demoralized," dealers who bought at from \$10 to \$13 per hundred pounds now offering them at from \$5 to \$7. The retail price of potatoes dropped to 6 cents a pound compared to eight and 9 cents a week ago.

Commissioner Hartigan asserted he had received an offer from two Pacific coast states to supply large quantities of potatoes at four cents a pound. Owing to the continuance of a boycott against live poultry by housewives on the East Side, few sales were made today, although it was twenty-five carloads were received here.


