



Missouri Cow's Record.

Charlotta Campus Girl, a pure bred Holstein four-year-old cow, bred and owned by the University of Missouri College of Agriculture, has recently established a new mark for four-year-olds in Missouri. She produced 99.9 pounds of milk Feb. 7, 1917, and thereby obtained the state record for cows of her age and the second highest record for cows of all ages. Missouri Chief Josephine was the granddam of Charlotta Campus Girl and was the one cow in the state to beat this record. She produced 110.2 pounds of milk in one day and holds the highest one-day record of cows of all ages in Missouri. She also was owned by the University of Missouri.

McCandless Pardoned.

Gov. Stanley issued a pardon to Claude McCandless, a prominent citizen of Smithland, sentenced to from two to 21 years in the penitentiary for the alleged killing of Barney Trimble at Smithland in 1914. Tuesday morning the appellate court of Kentucky affirmed the decision of the lower court, giving McCandless the sentence.

School Money Tied Up.

The March distribution of the state school funds, about \$500,000, the last for the pay of teachers for this school year, is delayed, awaiting the decision of the railroad franchise suits in the United States Supreme Court, which is expected soon. State Supt. V. O. Gilbert said this money was included in the estimate of \$3,805,000 school funds for the year, upon which the per capita allowance was made out. If the state loses, the distribution will be made out of next year's revenues, which will cause further delay.

Nine Princes Killed.

Another of Germany's best military aviators, Fritz Mannschoot has been killed in an airfight on the western front, according to a Berlin dispatch, transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at the Hague. Announcement is made that an airplane piloted by Prince Friederich Karl, a cousin of Emperor William, has not returned from a raid over the lines between Arras and Peronne. The death in active service of eight German Princes has been reported previously during the war—one of Hesse, two of Saxe Meiningen, three of Lippe, one of Reuss and one of Waldeck.

A special from Oklahoma City says that "by a suit decided in the Tulsa District Court last week, Judge Conn Linn, of Tulsa, formerly of Murray, Calloway county and for several years a member of the Kentucky State Senate, gets a one-sixteenth interest in oil property valued at \$250,000.
