

MEDICAL MEN TO MEET.

Seventh Semi-Annual Meeting of the Southern Kentucky Medical Association.

The seventh semi-annual meeting of the Southern Kentucky Medical Association will be held in this city on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 24 and 25. The sessions will be held in the circuit court rooms. The sessions will begin promptly at 10 o'clock each day.

The meeting will be called to order by President A. E. Gardner, of Morgantown. Rev. W. K. Piner, of Hopkinsville, will open the meeting with prayer. 
