Premier Clemenceau was so close to the fighting line Tuesday that he came within a few minutes of being captured by a patrol of Uhlans.

The fighting is nearing the railroad from Paris to Chalons in the historic region where Attila, the Hun, was turned back in the year 451 at Chalons.

Lieut. P. G. Mihleder, instructor at Taliaferro field, Ft. Worth, Tex., died Thursday morning from injuries received Wednesday afternoon when his machine crashed to the earth.

1,000 children from the Montmartre district of the city were placed on board a special train bound for a vacation colony in the department of Allier in central France.

Newspapers in Southern Germany published the following note from the German headquarters:

"The population should not expect our advance to continue at the same rate as on the first day. The resistance of the enemy is becoming desperate, and violent counter-attacks are to be expected.

Speaking of losses, the note adds that to estimate them correctly the people should not forget the gravity or importance of the struggle.

While it cannot be denied that the news from France is discouraging, it is not a time for faint-hearted admissions that the German invasion cannot be stopped.

IN HOPE TO AVOID DRAFT

BUFFALO, N. Y., YOUNG MAN IS LITERALLY ALIVE WITH DIVERGENT KINDS OF PHYSICAL DEFECTS.

Albany, N. Y., May 31—Man, know thyself!

That's a Biblical saying that a Buffalo youth took to heart. In a letter to the State Military Training Commission he made close application of the saying in explaining why he should not be compelled to take a course in military training prescribed by the State Military Law for youths between sixteen and nineteen.

"I wish to tell you that I am physically disqualified for military training, as a physical examination will show. The first physical defect I have is that I am near-sighted, the optic nerve in both my eyes being affected, or, in a medical term, I have compound myopia. Without my glasses I am almost blind.

"I also suffer with indigestion (chronic). After every meal I have distress. The umbilical region is most affected. "I am flat footed, also weak ankles, poorly nourished, and kind of hunch-backed, thin chested. I am also about thirty pound underweight. A young man of my height should weigh 130 or 140 pounds, I only weigh 108 pounds, with winter clothing on my body. I also have some kind of noise in my lungs when I breathe.

In a post scriptum he added: "I am also troubled with my spine and am very nervous." That, apparently, was an afterthought. Investigation by the Commission showed that the young man was a trifle near-sighted.

COLORED SCHOOL CENSUS.

Eph Poston has about completed taking the school census of the colored children. Under the present law the school census is taken biennially, or every two years. Since the census was taken two years ago a law has been passed reducing the maximum ages of school children from 20 to 18 years.

Two years ago the census showed 1450 colored school children. The present census shows up to this time, a total of 1230. Of this number 588 are girls and 642 are boys. There are a few more, possibly 20, to be added to the number as soon as some questions of age and residence can be adjusted.

The census under the new law will show an apparent reduction in the number of children of 250 or 260. This reduction is general all over the state. It will not affect the amount of money received by the boards from the state since lessening the number of children will permit an increase in the per capita per child.
