IGNORANCE OR IMPUDENCE?

There was a time when a statement ignorantly or impudently made concerning a sacred or vital question of great public concern might have been overlooked or excused. But that day is not now. The farmer who was asked a few days ago by ladies of the Red Cross to contribute a few pounds of tobacco to that organization and who answered, "No, let the government pay the bill," was either ignorant or impudent. In either case the man was unjustified and inexcusable.

When the world is on fire and men are giving their lives by the thousands to save our national life; when men, women and children by the millions are struggling day and night in the shops, fields and gardens to support the man on the battle front; when women by the thousands and multi-thousands are sewing, knitting, working day after day and night after night making supplies and raising money; and when young women and girls are offering their lives upon the sacrificial altar of service in the Red Cross hospitals in a ravaged and devastated country to minister to the sick and wounded and dying soldiers; when in view of all this, and more, one can pinch-up his soul and be a selfish, greedy, and miserly being is more than a reasonable and fair-minded person can comprehend.

There is no wonder that all the tobacco buyers who knew that the farmer said, "No, let the government pay the bill," passed his tobacco by and refused to bid on it at all. No surprise that he lost in price several times the amount asked for by the Red Cross ladies.

By no means is the above a typical example of the farmer. Nay, verily! It is rather an exception, because the average farmer has shown a spirit of patriotism second to none in the United States. However, if this were the only exception it is just one too many.

Let the government pay the bills? Who is the government? Not Woodrow Wilson. Not the President's cabinet. Not Congress. All these are merely representatives of the government, servants, if you please. The people are the government and each citizen an integral part thereof. Let the government pay the bills? Certainly the government must pay. The people are the government. Therefore the people must pay. If the man in question was ignorant, he should be sent to school. If he was impudent and defiant, he should be interned along with the Germans and treated as a disloyal American—a German propagandist.

May God forbid (and it is spoken reverently) that there should any longer be such ignorance among our people.

SOUTH AMERICA WILL BE CAUSE OF NEXT WAR WITH GERMANY, SAYS SHERMAN.

Seattle, Wash., May 30.—The United States must have a training school for 40,000 officers and raise an army of 20,000,000 men before the Hun can be thoroughly crushed, according to Father Thomas Ewing Sherman, son of General William T. Sherman, of Civil War fame.

"The only argument for a 15-inch gun is a 16-inch gun," declared Father Sherman, who is a Seattle visitor. "It is not a military possibility to dismember the German Empire. We can drive the Germans out of France, but we cannot change the German spirit of militarism. Our next war with Germany will be over South American possessions."
