RUTH BROWN BURNS FATAL

Ruth Brown, a little girl 11 years of age, daughter of Mrs. E. Brown, of the Eastberry neighborhood, died Sunday night of burns received when her clothing caught on fire.

First Maine Post Office. In 1879 the first post offices in Maine were established at Kennebec, Falmouth and Bath. The mails were carried by carriers on foot or on horseback and the average week's mail did not amount to five letters at each office. The rates were high, 8¢, 12¢, 18¢, 25 and 37½ cents, according to the distance the letter had to be carried, and double the rate when the letter was in more than one sheet of paper.
