Letter From East St. Louis.

East St. Louis, Ill., Aug. 1 1907.
Editor Record-Press:

Please permit me space in your valuable paper for me to tell something of our city.

East St. Louis is a city of 65000 people, located on Illinois side of the Mississippi river, opposite St. Louis, Mo. East St. Louis has splendid river navigation all the year round. There is no finer situation can be found in America than that of East St. Louis. Twenty-eight trunk lines of railroad center in this city, two belt lines encircle the entire city, connecting all the railroads. East St. Louis owing to her location, has mail and passenger service equal to that of St. Louis, the two cities, in that regard, being the same pullman cars run without change to all important cities.

The surface of the city and immediate surroundings, is almost level. It has been estimated, that St. Clair county, of which East St. Louis is the commercial Metropolis, has beneath its surface from three to five billion tons of coal. In the month of July 1906, coal was quoted at various mines nut, pea and slack at 60c and 80c per ton, and mine run at 80c to \$1.15 per ton. East St. Louis' water system was constructed at a cost of two million dollars. The filter system cost a

quarter of a million. There are 150 miles of coater mains, all water sent through the mains is first set in five large basins and then filtered through twenty-six of the modern mechanical filters, each containing six feet of sand and gravel so that it reaches the consumer perfectly clear and absolutely pure.

No city of its size employs more laborers at good prices than does East St. Louis. Politics is unknown in municipal elections. This city has 20 churches representing all the leading religious denominations and these churches are presided over by a corps of ministers that will compare favorably with those of any city of its size.

The pay rolls of wage earners amounts to one and one half million dollars per month. The worst feature of this city, is, that the lid is down tight of Sundays on every thing except saloons, and steps are being taken to force the city officials to see that the law is enforced and by so doing, we will ere long be able to report the three hundred whiskey dives of this city tightly closed on the day.

Indiana Bean Route Bottle Takes.

On the nineteenth of last January, at the time of the flood, Miss Nellie Caldwell, daughter of John Castella, of Palestine, near this city, placed a bottle, with her address on it, in the water. She notified her writing, giving the date, place and the person finding the bottle. She corked the bottle tightly and threw it into the waters of the river, near Palestine.

The incident had been forgotten until a day ago, when she received a letter from Fort Screven, Ga., bearing date of May 27, 1907, which stated the writer, Ernest McFadden, miller in the United States, stationed at that point, sixteen miles from Savannah, had found the bottle on the beach, where it had washed up, and that his letter was in response to the request of the writer, being inclosed.

The time between the bottling of the bottle into the river, New Palestine and the finding of the artilleryman was one hundred and twenty-nine days, and it is now how long it may have been on the beach before being picked up by the soldier, is not known. The map indicates that the bottle had a remarkable voyage down the White, Wabash and Mississippi rivers to the Gulf of Mexico to the East off the coast of Florida, thence northward along the Atlantic coast of Georgia till it reached the point.

The most direct route on the map from the mouth of the Mississippi river to Fort Screven is about 1,300 miles, and no doubt the bottle traveled much faster than the wandering in t.
