Central City, Oct. 30.—For three of the most beautiful days that ever came in any fall, the white silken badges of the delegates of the annual state gathering of Cumberland Presbyterians held Central City as a leash for good. From the very first a hospitality peculiarly Kentuckian and Cumberland Presbyterian pervaded the atmosphere. The retiring moderator, E. S. Eshman, of Bowling Green, preached the opening sermon at 7:30 Tuesday night, and the greatest synod ever held in Kentucky was constituted. Rev. J. L. Price, of Providence, was made moderator, and Colonel E. B. McEuen, of Sacramento, was made stated clerk. The doors of the Southern Presbyterian church, only a block distant, were open to the sessions of the Woman's Synodic Missionary Society, and both of these bodies report unusually fine meetings. At no one service could all the people be seated. Truly it was a great gathering. And the crowds were the least thing about it. Work was done which will tell all through the year. The synod adjourned at 10 o'clock on Thursday night to meet in Marion next Oct.
