#### PAYMENTS AT SLAUGHTERSVILLE, KY.

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, Sept. 18, 19 and 20, payment will be made for all tobacco delivered at Slaughtersville, and to those delivering to John H. Hodges Tobacco Co., at Sebree, Ky.

#### PAYMENTS AT MADISONVILLE, KY.

Wednesday and Thursday, September 20 and 21, payment will be made on the tobacco delivered at Madisonville, Ky.

#### PAYMENTS AT PROVIDENCE, KY.

Friday, Saturday and Monday, Sept., 22, 23 and 25, payments will be made for tobacco delivered at Providence, Ky.

#### PAYMENTS AT MARION, KY.

From Tuesday noon to Wednesday noon, Sept., 25 and 27, payments will be made on tobacco delivered at Marion, Ky.

#### PAYMENTS AT MORGANFIELD, KY.

Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Sept., 28, 29 and 30, payment will be made on tobacco delivered at Morganfield, Ky., and on the unfired tobacco delivered at the Elliot factory at Henderson, Ky.

#### MUST PRESENT TICKETS

Members will remember that it will be necessary to present tickets received at the time of delivery when applying for this dividend. In no case will set-



tlement be made with other than the owner of tobacco unless all weigh tickets are presented. In arranging the dates of the payments for the outside points we have tried to reverse the order of last year.

If not convenient for members to attend the places of payment to settle in person, they may mail their weigh tickets to this office after October 1, inclosing self addressed stamped envelope, and check will be sent by return mail.

Do not mail tickets before the time stated, as we will not have time to attend to them, and besides the books will be out till the time stated.

It is recommended to members to preserve the foregoing article for reference.

#### Timely Advice from Mr. Elliott.

In a recent article in the Henderson papers Mr. Banks published an interview with Mr. Wm. Elliott, in which the General Manager gave some timely advice to members as to the method of handling the present crop of tobacco in order to put it in the best condition to meet the requirements of market conditions.

Growers know how to raise tobacco, prepare it for market, but when that is done they are at the end of their row. They do not know what it is worth, they know nothing of market conditions that govern the price of their crop.

Before the Association was organized, after a man had raised a crop of tobacco he had absolutely no idea what it was worth, until the buyer told him what he would give for it. The buyer knew what it was worth. He had the advantage in the trade. That being the rule of trade, he usually took the advantage. We are making no complaint, neither should he make any if growers put themselves in position to guard their interests.

Since the organization of the Association, conditions have changed. While the grower is still of himself, unable to know much of market conditions, by ten-thousand combining their efforts, they have for a very small amount of money from each, been able to hire a man who in point of ability and experience is the peer of any man that the trust can put in the field. It is his duty to know of conditions that govern the to-

has to trade and advise you of it inasmuch as it effects your interest.

His advice is in substance about as follows:

That he was compelled last year to sell unfired tobacco 50c per cwt. under the price of fired tobacco. That the market is still well stocked with unfired tobacco at this time but is not nearly so well supplied with the fired article. He strongly urged members of this District to fire and fire well this year.

#### Ollie James The Hero.

The tragedy at Cannonsburg, Penna., wherein dozens of women and children lost their lives at a moving picture show, recalls an incident in the life of Ollie M. James, the big Representative from Kentucky.

At Marion, Kentucky, down in the Pennyrile District, James, home, some fifteen years ago, a High School Commencement was in progress. This occurred at the old Opera House, situated on the second floor of the business block, and some thirty-five or forty steep steps from the street.

All the boys, girls and their parents of Marion and two counties, were present, crowded back to the one exit, and down the stairs. It was before the days of electricity in Marion, and the scene was dimly lighted with oil chandeliers, which smoked and flickered in the breezy old hall. While a dainty little graduate was declaiming earnestly, pointing to the old cracked ceiling, where she saw in imagination the pinnacle of success, towards which our footsteps were gravely directed. Crash! one of the chandeliers fell, directly in front
