THE CONFERENCE.

FRIDAY.

Friday's session of Conference was pleasant and interesting and the reports were highly encouraging to those interested in the work and efforts of the denomination. Dr. T. R. Kendall, of Owensboro, made a good report stating that the old debt hanging over the Church had been paid and 144 members added to the Church. Likewise all the Ministers of the Owensboro District made good reports showing that they had been faithful to their trusts and that they had been blessed by gathering in many sheaves. Rev. Geo. E. Foskett made a good report from the Henderson District. Rev. Geo. Needham whose health failed sent in a very touching letter and his name was referred to the Committee on Superannuated ministers. Rev. S. G. Shelley, the Presiding Elder of the Columbia District, made an unusual good report showing over 900 professions during the last Conference year. Dr. Gross Alexander made a statement in regard to his work and imparted the information that shows he is a zealous, earnest worker—one not seeking the most lucrative position but working in a sphere to better humanity. He stated that he had given up a position in Vanderbilt University of \$2,400 per annum to accept work in the Louisville Conference. Dr. Tigert made a statement as Book Editor. He said that more books were printed in Nashville than any other city in the United States, except New York, Chicago, Boston and Philadelphia, and that Nashville leads all others in sending out Sunday school supplies except Philadelphia. SATURDAY. The session on Saturday was one of the most interesting of the entire Conference. The morning session was devoted in the main, to the school question, but in advance of this Rev. L. E. Campbell made his report as agent of the Preacher's Aid Society. The propriety of retaining an agent for this work was discussed, in general, but its advocates won and Mr. Campbell was elected again to carry on the good work so faithfully and energetically begun. The school question followed and Rev. C. B. Payne was elected to represent the Conference in the District, to secure subscriptions and cash to the amount of \$8,000—the sum required by the committee on schools for the establishing of their Training School in this town. The action and result of this matter is here omitted, as it appears in another column. In the afternoon another session was held and important business transacted. Quite a discussion was indulged in concerning the price of the Christian Advocate, the official organ of the M. E. Church, South. It was thought by some that the price of the paper was too high. The Bishop made a talk, asking that the members write and work up a feeling to get its price reduced. He stated that the paper had less than 5,000 subscribers outside the preachers. Dr. Watkins represented his work, the raising of \$5,000,000, the interest on which was to be used for the benefit of "worn out preachers," their widows and orphans. He made many happy hits, and among them he derided the idea that the Lord will provide food, clothing, etc., referring to the Raven which fed Elijah, he said so far as he knew "the ravens had gone out of the grocery business." After his speech a collection was taken to the amount of \$1,250. Monday the Committees made very satisfactory reports after which the appointments, which are as follows, were announced, and the body adjourned:
