I have been intending to write a short letter to the good old Adair County News ever since I came to Texas, but owing to the pressing needs of my new field of labor, I have not found time until the present.

On the first of last October I began work in the beautiful little city of Belton, located in the very center of the great "lone star state," and having within its limits 6000 souls. It is certainly a southern city in hospitality, politics and climate, for it has hardly been cold enough for frost this winter.

We have just entertained the Christian District convention at the church where I preach. The district is composed of about ten or twelve counties taking in the towns of Taylor, Georgetown, Temple, Lampasas, Troy and Waco, where Texas Christian University is located. We entertained about 35 or 40 delegates besides quite a number of visiting friends.

The following are some of the men who gave addresses during the convention: J. C. Mason, State Secretary of mission work; Colby D. Hall, Secretary of state education. Dr. Clinton Lockhart,

who once lived in Columbia and had charge of C. C. College. He is now president of Texas Christian University and is loved and admired by the Disciples of Texas, Cho. Lockhart, Waco. F. W. O. Molly, Temple, E. L. Crystal, Lampasas, and quite a number of others.

Most of the preachers in attendance were former Kentuckians and it was a great treat for us to be together and talk about the grand old state of Kentucky. At the last session of the convention we had five additions to the church which indicates that lasting good has been done.

Our work here is in a very good condition. We have had quite a struggle in overcoming some troubles that have arisen in former years, but the board of officer's think the church is in the best condition now, it has ever experienced, with the brightest prospects.

Our stay in Texas has been very pleasant indeed. We have found the people as warm hearted and hospitable as the weather has been pleasant and inviting, but in spite of all that I have mentioned I frequently open my window (like Daniel of old) toward the land of my Father's, and dream of its past joys, and picture the glories of its coming years and generations. So in a few weeks Mrs. Montgomery and I expect to say Good bye to the toils and joys of the city of Belton and going by way of Galveston, New Orleans and up through the Sunny South to Kentucky where we shall spend the summer in protracted meeting work.
