Dale & Garvin are rigging up preparatory to commencing drilling on their No. 1, on the T. M. Glidewell farm, on Brush Creek, for the Southern Oil & Refining Co.

The No. 1, on the Frank Radford farm, on Brush Creek, has considerably improved in its production as a result of being shot recently.

The McClintock Oil Co.'s No. 1, on the Wm. Ragle farm, on Bear Creek, will be shot today. It is about 1 1/2 miles from the wells recently drilled by the same people on the C. C. Smith farm, in the same vicinity.

The McClintock Oil Co.'s No. 2, on the G. W. Coop, Jr., farm, on Sulphur Creek, has been somewhat delayed by Mr. Heckathorn getting his hand severely mashed, but is expected in Friday.

Lynch, Wick & McKee are spudding in on their No. 1, on the G. W. Coop, Sr., farm, on Sulphur Creek.

S. S. Wilson is still fishing on his No. 2, on the G. W. Coops, Sr., lands.

J. A. Gartlan is drilling on his No. 1, on the Millard Kerr farm, on Kettle Creek. This is the first test to be made in that immediate section though oil has been found on practically all sides of it and the result is awaited with considerable interest by the oil fraternity here.

C. A. Gartlan, of Lexington, is spudding in on the No. 1, on the Wix Donaldson farm, near Neeleys' Ferry. This farm joins the J. R. Neeley farm, upon which two good wells were drilled several years ago, and it is expected that Mr. Gartlan will make a good strike there.

Drilling on the No. 1, on the James Williams farm, on Casey's Fork, of Marrowbone creek, has for the present been suspended at around 700 feet, and the own-

The McClintock Oil Co.'s No. 1, on the Wm. Ragle farm, on the Norris Fork, of Bear Creek, was shot today at 360 feet, in the Upper Sunny Brook sand, and cleaned out and will be tubed and put on the pump at once. It has lots of oil in the hole and look good. This well is one and one-half miles east of the wells on the Keen and Smith farms, and is a very important extension to the Bear Creek pool, and its coming in at this time assures

quite a lot of development work in that section in the near future. Richardson & Goff have made locations for well No. 3, on the J. M. Radford 50 acre tract and drilling will be started as soon as a contractor can be secured. The J. M. Radford 100 acre lease being operated by the Walker Oil Co. On this lease

well No. 4 was drilled in last year and thought to be dry, but upon examination a few days ago, oil was found to be standing in the hole and six barrels was pumped out and it looks now like it will make a nice pumper. Louisville parties, operating the Potts lease in Irish Bottom, have well No. 3, and No. 1 and 2 will be placed on the pump as

soon as Power, engine and tanks can be installed. Drilling operations are steadily increasing in the Cumberland River Oil Fields, good wells are being drilled in each week, which cover a wide area of Cumberland county, the coming spring and summer months will certainly see some rapid development.
